

Heart Attack, Stroke & Cardiac Arrest Symptoms:

If these warning signs are present call 911.

Heart Attack Symptoms:

<u>Chest Discomfort:</u> Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

<u>Discomfort in other Areas of the Upper Body:</u> symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

Shortness of Breath: with or without chest discomfort.

Other Signs: may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness. Catch the signs early don't wait to get help if you experience any heart attack warning signs. Some heart attacks are sudden and intense, but others start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort. Pay attention to your body and call 911 if you experience:

Stroke Symptoms: Spot a Stroke F.A.S.T.

Face Drooping: does one side of the face droop or is it numb? Ask the person to smile.

Arm Weakness: is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

Speech difficulty: if speech is slurred, are they unable to speak, or are they hard to understand? Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence, like "the sky is blue". Is the sentence repeated correctly?

Time to call 911: if the person shows any of these symptoms, even if the symptoms go away, call 911 and get them to the hospital immediately,

F.A.S.T. Warning Signs: (Use the letter in FAST to spot a Stroke)

F= face drooping

A=Arm Weakness

S=Speech difficulty

T=Time to call 911

Other stroke symptoms:

watch for sudden: Numbness-or weakness in face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body, confusion-trouble speaking, trouble seeing-in one or both eyes, trouble walking-dizziness, loss of balance, severe headachewith no know cause.

Call 911 or get them to the hospital as soon as possible.

Tribal and State Relations Committee

On January 9, 2024, at 11:00 am the North Dakota Tribal and State Relation Committee met at the new MHA Nation New Town, ND. The Committee was given a tour before the grand opening to show the new facility.

At 1:00 pm the North Dakota State Tribal and State Relations Committee met with MHA nation Chairman Fox.

Mandaree Representative Sherry Turner-Lone Fight, New town Representative Monica Mayer, and Four Bears Representative Robert White at the MHA Nation Tribal Headquarters building. We discussed tribal- state issues including government to government relations, human \parallel Public Comment was also taken by those in services, community safety, natural resources, agriculture, | attendance: irrigation, and issues related to the promotion of economic I introduced Michael DeVille and mentioned how North development.

Chairman Fox spoke about economic development, oil and gas, and the Good Road treatment center in Bismarck. Representative Sherry Turner-Lone Fight mentioned that I on the importance of the MHA Nation Flag Song to be Mandaree needs help with electricity, water and sewer connections to complete projects and the continuous pollution of frack sand along state highways. Representative Monica Mayer spoke about the depletion of Fox Aguifer. The aguifer that produces water for MHA Nation. She also spoke of student population at New Town School.

Representative Robert White spoke about the State Highways acknowledging the ND DOT.

agencies. The Department of Water Resources presented that he didn't think so due to federal recognition and policy changes to the State Water Commission cost shareprogram. North Dakota Irrigation Association presented on irrigation development in ND. And the North Dakota Game and Fish Department presented the reintroduction of bighorn sheep to the Fort Berthold Reservation.

The Committee held a group discussion and created multiple directives. I discussed Native American Referees at look into it. I reminded him Spirit Lake Nation changed Native American teams participating against non-native teams and the issues that our tribal school teams face. Robert White suggested the creation of a Native American referee association.

I spoke about the garbage/trash that's scattered along state highways 22, 23, and 73 on Ft. Berthold Reservation, most of which is produced by oil field traffic. I shared that my family adopted 3 miles along highway 22, in which we picked up 163 bags of trash of filter socks, and work gloves (that does not include the large items) the first time in spring. Second time in fall, same year we picked 80 more bags of trash.

I discussed my support for US Vehicle Emissions law to limit the creation of smog due to our proximity to the Bakken. I shared how we have many diesel fueled vehicles and that I oppose that the State of ND filed lawsuit opposing the emissions law.

Kidney Dialysis building located in We also discussed polling locations that need to be reopened prior to the 2024 Election. We are working with Dunn County auditor on the east Mandaree location and find workers with our representatives' assistance. We are also working on McKenzie County Four Bears location and guaranteed workers with Robert White. I was going to do a bill on this guaranteeing that the voting machines will be provided, and locations funded but it was suggested that I hold a meeting with Michael Howe ND Secretary of State to discuss my concerns.

Dakota touts the relationship they have with the North Dakota tribes and stated how we need to act on the wishes of the tribes. Michael DeVille gave comments sung at the sporting events where MHA nation teams are participating. I did invite other MHA nation basketball teams coaches to speak on the importance, but they could not make it due to games and practice. I also invited Charlie Moran to explain the creation and the importance of MHA Nation Flag Song.

After the meeting adjourned, I asked Chairman Fox if the sign "Fort Berthold Indian Reservation" at the There were several presentations given by different | entries of the reservation could be changed. He stated treaties. I requested that the name be changed to the Three Affiliated Tribes or Mandan Hidatsa and Arikara Nation. I feel that Fort Berthold Indian Reservation is not a traditional name, Berthold is named after white guy and the misnomer of Indian is because Columbus thought he landed in India. Chairman Fox said, we will their name from Fort Totten to be more culturally appropriate.

I am honored to be featured on as the spotlight on the United States Environmental Protection Agency, American Indian Environmental Office for Native American month social medias; EPA All Nations Twitter site and AIEO Facebook site.

#NAHM2023 AIEO is spotlighting Lisa DeVille, member of the Three Affiliated Tribes on the Fort Berthold Reservation in North Dakota. Lisa is the cocreator and Vice President of Fort Berthold Protectors of Water Earth Rights, a grassroots organization fighting pollution.

Lisa DeVille was honored at the NAHAM 49 Annual Conference held in Orlando, Florida from May 2 to May 5, 2023. The conference focused on Patient Access: Imagine. Influence. Impact. Attendees had the opportunity to reconnect with colleagues and participate in educational sessions. Learning Lab On Demand Packages. Lisa DeVille's contributions were recognized during this significant healthcare management gathering.

OMB, BLM Methane Rule

I gave a public verbal comment on the OMB, BLM Methane Rule. Here it is for review;

Hi my name is Lisa Finley-DeVille. I am an enrolled member of the Mandan, Hidatsa, Arikara Nation. I and my family live in the heart of the North Dakota oil and gas fields on Fort Berthold Reservation.

I am currently serving as the State Representative for District 4a, which encompasses my entire reservation.

My reservation is highly impacted by oil and gas development and as a result has significant methane waste from flaring venting, and leaks along with many other environmental impacts.

I am here today to urge for a strong rule that works to control the waste of methane in communities like mine.

Methane waste for communities like mine means lost revenue (such as taxes and royalties), as well as health impacts from the impaired air quality that occurs when methane is vented or flared.

It is imperative that the federal government act swiftly to finalize a strong rule. Because people in my community have to rely on federal rules and regulations to control the oil and gas industry, because we lack local and state laws that effectively address the issue of methane flaring, venting, and leaks.

In fact, I would argue that finalizing a strong rule is a part of your trust responsibility to my tribe as the federal government.


Mandaree School Building Security Policy

The Building Security Policy:


All Visitors/Parents/Vendors will no longer be permitted unaccompanied access into the school during the school day.





Naaman



In today reading (2Kings 5:1-19) we hear of Naaman the great and powerful warrior who is also a leper. There's several lessons God is pointing out to us in this reading. What are they? I will get to them but 1st let me remind you that the Old Testament stories fore shadow the coming of Christ. How is that done here in this reading, what comes to mind 1st with me is the number seven. Naaman was told to go plunge himself 7 times into the Jordon River. Why the number 7, why 7 times, and why no 1 or 2 times? We also know that today in the Church

we have sacraments: 1. Baptism, 2. Reconciliation, 3. Confirmation, 4. Anointing of the sick, 5. Holy Eucharist, 6. Holy Matrimony, 7. Holy Orders. Also, remember Jesus was baptized in the Jordon River. Naaman's plunging into the river foreshadows Jesus's Baptism.

The Story of Naaman and today's readings are rich and full of valuable lessons for us. If you read 2nd Kings Chapter 5 you learn who Naaman is and shows a bigger picture of how Naaman's personality is a lot like many of us, I can relate to him. You see it doesn't matter how powerful we think we are. We are all vulnerable. He suffers from more than just leprosy, you see he is full of pride. He was taken aback with pride, when Elisha didn't come out to speak to him directly, but sent a messenger to tell him to go plunge himself into a river that was known to be very dirty, murky and muddy. His pride almost makes him miss the blessing. You see God doesn't always work to our expectations

I just like him, have let pride get in the way of God's blessings for me, many times I let my own expectations get in the way. Such as Naaman's expectations of what he thinks God should be doing in his life. Because God is good, he works with Naaman and our faith even if its imperfect.

Because Naaman has humility and obedience he goes and plunges himself seven times, he comes out completely healed of his leprosy. He was filled with gratitude that he asked to take some of the earth back with him, because to him the ground was holy. Because he experienced God there, that's what the two mule loads of earth are about. He wanted to take it back to his home. We have all experienced God in our own way in life. We carry those God moments with us just like Naaman wanted to take the very spot he experienced God back home with him, those are powerful moments of gratitude. Let's look at how it is related in the New Testament. The first reading (Luke 17:11-19) is of course they were healed from a very powerful disease. Second, the foreigners gave thanks, Naaman and the Samaritan. Third they both received their blessings from a distance and Naaman's was to plunge himself and the Ten Lepers were to go themselves to the priests. They both surrendered

and moved with faith. I'm sure there is more examples of how the readings are connected, but when we come to church to gather together and worship. We hear God speak to us through the scriptures. Here today, he is showing us his mercy he has for all of us. He is showing us that blessings will come and have come to be, which are the Sacraments of the Church. By washing Naaman clean, he washes us clean at our Baptism. He is showing us that his blessings are for all of us who believe in him. Just like in Psalm 98, "The Lord has revealed to the nations his saving power". Jesus reveals himself as God to the Samaritan who is us. We too may feel at times that we are at a distance from God. We just have to have faith and he will do the rest.
