

Councilwoman Turner-Lone Fight Update



First of all, I would like to take a moment to express my sincere condolences to those family and relatives who recently lost their beloved ones. Our heartfelt prayers go out to your families and extended relatives. As we all approach this New Year of 2021 we all hope and pray for a more positive and healthier upcoming new year.

This past month was a very busy month for us here in our community of West Segment. We had to get ready for a lot of events that would be safe for everyone due to the Covid-19 guidelines. We tried our best this year to help everyone in our community with their Christmas presents and provided gift cards to household members for their meals. A very special thank you to Enerplus Resources who provided a family game with popcorn, hot chocolate and a wonderful Christmas card. Overall, our Holiday Season went well this year, we did the best we could to help make this Holiday Season a

nice one for our community members. West Segment gave out a \$75.00 dollar gift cards to each household member with Santa's elves who prepared Christmas gifts for the children and teenagers. Also the Spiritual walk-ride took place on December 29th which began at 1:00pm at the junction of 14 & 17 (by Ethan's Hall's) southeast of Mandaree.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank the personnel who worked late to prepare presents, and to those who were on hand to help with the drive through gift giving as our community people came through. Thank you for all your hard work and efforts I fully appreciate the help from the personnel if it wasn't for them this would not have taken place.

I would like to remind our community members of our curfew that's in place for West Segment it's from 10pm to 7am. I am requesting that each of you abide by this curfew and be in your homes before this time frame. Another reminder is our Chairman Mark Fox, will soon have in place a fine for persons not following the Covid-19 guidelines that were set up by the tribe.

Update on the housing issue, many of these homes need a lot of repairs and we are getting to them. We recently put the rent down in the White Oak trailer homes, and Black Eagle Estates, we are looking at rent to own with those who are up to date on their rent. Rent need to be paid coming in March or eviction notices will be sent out to those who have taken advantage of the Hidatsa homes. Keep in mind, West Segment has no funds to pay for utilities for tenants as it was done in the past. Some tenants have rent that is overdue 5 to 10 thousand dollars we can't have this anymore. We will do our best to assist otherwise. The Director will go by the housing policies. I ask you please do not come to me to over turn any decisions the director has made the records they keep are accurate. Hidatsa Housing will fall under the newly elected community board. We did away with the West Segment Development Board this board no longer exists.

Drug tests will be administered to adult housing residents who live in the White Oak and Black Eagle homes and any other future rentals these homes are drug free homes. Due to drug abuse the homes that were ruined have cost the segment thousands of dollars to get them cleaned out due to drug abuse. We will be demolishing West Segment housing that no longer are usable due too drugs, mis-care, weather and water damage.

The house on highway 22 will be home to MHA Land & Livestock/Culture. The old community center is the home to our Rehab Center called CARE. This building is under a complete renovation, which needs a new roof so they are having that repaired. So far, everything is coming along great. Our headquarters is also getting fixed up due to neglect of our building but will be saved and utilized.

Councilwoman Turner-Lone Fight Update

On a good note, we are opening up the Fitness Center by appointments only. Our recreational facilities will be opening soon using COVID-19 guidelines. Departments are doing a great job keeping their employees accountable and providing services to the community. Community board elections will be on February 11, 2021. I look forward to working with great people who will be elected to serve our West Segment community.

I am proud to announce the Mandaree Community Board was given back to the people of West Segment. Members of the community will vote for five individuals to serve our segment, these members will oversee advisory boards, Hidatsa Housing and community functions, and reports to the Administration the community needs. They must also attend TBC meetings when they're open to the public. Develop a Economic plan and four year plan. Once again, voting is to take place on February 11, 2021.

I would also like to mention the satellite offices are now renamed and called Outreach Program Centers and for our West Segment community members I would like them to know the Minot Outreach Program along with Bismarck, Mandan and Lincoln centers will be reaching out to our West Segment community members.

In other information that I want to keep you informed on is in a Tribal Council Executive meeting Chairman Fox committed to helping us with our Assisted Living quarters which was great news, my next venture is to find the property for our assisted living quarters.

Any elder who needs minor work done or help moving items in their homes or if they need anything else to please call the West Segment office you can speak with Loretta Lone Bear.

On another note, I would like to inform everyone that West Segment Regulatory is no longer exits in our community, this was done in the best interest for our West Segment community. DOT substation is now in our community they will be stationed here at the community center, they have the authority to stop trucks within our reservation boundaries.

West Segment recently implemented an Education Department and we now have a Education Specialist, Sandy Young Bird, she can assist anyone in any age group who wishes to go to college. She will assist in any way she can. As soon as her office is established and a phone number is in place we will inform everyone so you will be able to contact her with your needs.



humbling experience. As tribes people before we start any event we always start with a prayer. Everyone gathered for the prayer before the ride/walk began. The prayer was led by Peter Swift Bird, from Pine Ridge, South Dakota. After the prayer, Pete than went around and smudged the riders and horses. According to Swift Bird he told all participates, "this gathering that's taking place its like a sweat lodge and a Sundance, I say that because we will stop four times along the way. We will offer a prayer at each stop, while others can share what losses they have or relatives they lost due to Covid-19 or drug/alcohol abuse". This ride/walk all started from a



dream Tex Hall had he felt the need to do something for our people here on Fort Berthold. Due to the loss of our relatives to Covid-19, for the loss of our relatives to drugs and alcohol, and for the

pipeline that is coming through lands within the Fort Berthold boundaries. Tex also mentions this ride coincides with the 130th Anniversary of the Wounded Knew Massacre. Tex stated; "I recently talked to my brother Pete, and told him what I wanted to do this ride/walk than Pete offered to come and help. I told him that would be good so he's here helping us with this ride/walk." When Tex was done telling all the participates, it was time for the ride/walk to begin their journey. As they started the ride/walk it was led by West Segment Security, Robin Hall and followed by a trailer with hot coffee and hot chocolate the trailer was pulled by Adam Fredericks.



This ride started on route 17 and had four stops along the way with a prayer with other participates sharing as well. You had to be there to feel the humbleness from everyone especially when we stopped and prayed It was truly a humbling feeling.



Pictured to your left from right to left are Peter Swift Bird, Lindsey Fox and Rosie White Owl were the walkers of the first mile. Peter Swift Bird stated; "I wanted to walk the first mile, and feel the earth and the land as I walked". He laughed when they came to the next stop and

they went through a lot of hardship within the past few months. The Smith family recently lost Wyatt Smith. So I'm praying for them all". He also acknowledged Taco Chase and his family and thanked Councilwoman Turner-Lone Fight for starting the ride at 1pm instead of 10am out of respect

for the funeral of Taco Chase that was being held on the day of the ride..



Todd Hall also spoke and mentioned how he would pray real hard for the Smith family. Todd went on to say; "they took care of my dad and my aunt Flo when they passed on. The Smith family don't say no when you ask them for their help". When the ride came to the last stop, Peter Swift Bird, Tex Hall, Todd Hall and Councilwoman


Turner-Lone Fight and others had black tobacco ties that were hung on a



tree. Before they put their tobacco ties on the tree Peter Swift Bird offered a prayer and sang four songs before each individual tied their prayer flags on. At the end Tex Hall spoke about what they called the black snake the pipeline of how we must come together and fight that. Todd Hall also spoke about the importance of Education. He stated; "The ones we have to go up against have education, suits and computers, we need to educate our children so they can go up

against these suits who are trying to take advantage of us". Councilwoman Turner-Lone Fight was asked to say a few words. As she says; "I am very humbled and grateful for everyone who participated. I'm glad everything turned out good, thank you." After everything was done everyone gathered by the trailer to eat soup, frybread, a sandwich, coffee, and hot chocolate. The food was provided by Councilwoman Turner-Lone Fight and Rosie White Owl who helped her prepare the meal for everyone. This was indeed a very spiritual ride and walk for everyone who participated. You couldn't help but feel the good feelings from all the prayers.

- If the elder is 65 and older and still working, they could still be eligible for Medicare Part A.

God's Power Is Made Perfect in Our Weakness



If hindsight is 20/20, what did the past year 2020 mean? Issues still remain surrounding racial injustices, protests, riots, and last year's election. It has even affected the way we worship together at church. MHA Drug Enforcement

How Can We Help Keep Our Community & Family Safe:

We all know that drugs have taken over our reservation and ahold of our young Native people. How can we make a difference to get the drug dealers off the reservation and out of our communities?

How To Report:

- First, make sure that you have written down all the information that you will need. You want to make sure that your report will be detailed and accurate, so that it will be useful to drug enforcement agents.
- Make sure that you are able to provide the exact address of the location where you suspect drug activity is happening. If you know the full names of the people who live there, provide that information too.
- If you see a car connected with the drug-related activity, take note of the license plate. You should also write down when the car arrives, how long it remains at the address and how frequently it appears.
- You should also tell the authorities if you see small packages being exchanged. These could be either drugs or money.
- 5. You will also want to point out anything else specific you know. Are there children living there? Are there dogs on the property? Is there a specific time of day where the activity most often occurs? Make notes of anything you think might be relevant.

Contact Local Resources:

Your first step should be to contact the police department nearest you. If you feel unsafe, or feel that something is dangerous is presently happening, call the police on your area's emergency number immediately.

- Ask the person handling your call who you can speak to about reporting drug-related activity. It is possible a clerk may take your report and pass it along to the appropriate department. If you would feel more comfortable, you can ask to be connected to an officer who handles drug related crimes.
- Use 1-844-865-2179 tip hotline or text-a-tip to MHATIPS these are numbers and apps you can use to report illegal drug activity.



Angus Bernard Fox, 84, New Town died Wednesday, December 16, 2020, in his home, under the loving care of his wife Ira and youngest daughter, Bethany. Angus was born May 12, 1936, in Elbowoods, to Guy and Grace (Parshall) Fox. He was a member of the Prairie Chicken Clan and a child of a Flint Knife Clan. He was educated at the Shell Creek Day School and Elbowoods High School. The rising waters of the Garrison Dam forced him to finish his senior year as a Cowboy at Killdeer High School. Angus was not a Cowboy at Killdeer High but became one of the most successful cowboys in the state of North Dakota. His career started when he was about 14 or 15 at the Fettig Rodeo just northwest of Killdeer. They were having a wild horse race and Buzz Fredericks asked if he could ride, Angus said, "they got the horse down, I got on and went this way and that way and back this way and it was done. I stayed on and won. It was the first thing I ever won in my life." But it wouldn't be the last. During his distinguished rodeo career, he amassed numerous championships in both high school and amateur. In high school, he won the 1954 Saddle Bronc Championship, 1955 Bareback Championship and Calf roping Championship. He captured the NDRA Saddle Bronc Championship 10 times in 1956, 1957, 1959, 1961,1963,1967, 1968,1970,1972 and 1973. He also captured the NDRA Bareback Championship in 1965. In the Great Plains Indian Rodeo Association, he won the Saddle Bronc Championship three times in 1969,1970 and 1973. During those years, his chief rivals for those championships were his brother, Esley, Ed Hall and Mervel Hall. When Angus didn't win, it was one of those rivals, but all close friends, that took the championship. Angus rode collegiately in 1958 at Dickinson State College for the rodeo team consisting of Tex Appledorn, Dale Jorgenson, Dale Little Soldier, Pete Fredericks, his brother Esley Thorton and himself. The team captured the Rocky Mountain Regional Championship. That win allowed the team to ride at the National Championship Rodeo in Colorado Springs, CO, where they finished third. Many who spoke of seeing Angus ride, described his style as more finesse than brawn. Being in tune with the horse, moving as it moved. Anticipating. Angus could have turned pro and went on the rodeo circuit, but his sensibility and dedication to his children and family kept him in North Dakota. He had a 40+ year career in the Bureau of Indian Affairs. He started out as a bus driver in Twin Buttes in 1062, facilities maintenance then management in the 70's in Mandaree and New Town, with him taking over as Facilities Manager for all of Fort Berthold in 1980. His last assignment started in 1992, as Agency Administrative Officer, which included acting Superintendent of the Fort Berthold Agency, until his retirement on June 30, 2003. After his distinguished riding career ended, he was a rodeo judge for numerous rodeos including the NDRA Finals for seven years, numerous high school rodeos and a collegiate rodeo with his older brother Esley. He also did rodeo instruction for high school and instruction for qualifying issues for the Great Plains Indian Rodeo Association prior to their finals. After leaving the rodeo life, he continued raising mainly Paint horses as a member of the American Paint Horse Association for many years after his retirement. His love for horses started at an early age when his family lived in the Shell Creek area. That love continued through his rodeo days and well into retirement when he would drive down to his ranch daily to feed his 30+ head herd. The sound of his voice was all his horses needed to hear to make them come running. Once his rodeo career was over, another passion he held onto through his entire adult life started to ramp up~ singing with the Mandaree Singers. Angus was always a very traditional man, serving as Senior Pallbearer numerous times as part of the Hidatsa Clan traditions, as well as writing numerous songs for individuals throughout the reservation and beyond. He could always be seen at pow wows sitting in his pickup or at the drum listening to his cassette recorder, getting ready to sing the song a donating family was requesting for a loved one. He particularly enjoyed the camaraderie with his fellow Mandaree Singers and everyone on the pow-wow trail. Having sang with Mandaree singers, Billy Baker, Art Smith, Finnigan and Norman Baker, Burt Yellow Wolf, John Sitting Crow, Seymore Eagle Speaker and his brother Rex Fox, just to name a few. He was known for his teasing of young and old alike and for his "Syox (Sioux) and "Wong" jokes not once or twice, but many times, most times barely managing to get the joke out before erupting in laughter. With all his accomplishments, Angus always remained a very humble man. When people spoke of his accomplishments in rodeo or singing, he was quick to deflect the praise for those that served in the military, to whom he looked up to including his brothers, Esley, Rex and Maynard and numerous relatives. One of Angus proudest moments came when he was inducted into the North Dakota Cowboy Hall of Fame in 2009 in Medora, having been nominated by former college rodeo teammate and lifelong friend, Dale Jorgenson. Angus was raised in a strict Catholic family. He remained active throughout his life including regularly reading during mass for Father Stephen Kranz at St. Anthony in Mandaree and later for Father Lukach at St. Anthony in New Town. When he was unable to attend church, he regularly watched it on TV. Above all, Angus lived his life with values he learned early in life and passed down to this children, many nieces and nephews, grandchildren, and other. He understood that actions always speak louder than words. The values of responsibility, dependability, punctuality, honesty and keeping your word most times weren't taught with words but through example he lived on a daily basis. While his stern teachings seemed harsh, those lessons and examples became crystal clear one we became adults and parents. While he was blessed with tremendous athletic talent, throughout his life in whatever sport he chose, Angus worked hard at staying in shape mind and body. Whatever sport, the pinpoint concentration, the determination for improvement, the hard work was always there. When his son Mark took up golf in high school, Angus also began playing. When he was riding, he used to joke that he couldn't get what people saw in chasing around a little white ball. He became pretty accomplished at it. When he wasn't golfing with his boys, Mark, Bernie and Scott, he was golfing after work with Ed Lone Fight and Jimmy Bluestone, to name a few. In keeping with his strong Indian traditions, Angus was a member of the Kit Fox Society. He took his uncle Charles Parshall's position. He also sang society songs for the Antelope Society.

Reba Jean Walker, named Abiiweash (Corn Silk Woman), was born in the Elbowoods community hospital on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation on September 25, 1931. The youngest daughter of Mercy Baker and Hans Walker Sr., Reba was a member of the Maxooxadi (Alkalai Lodge Clan) and a child of the Apuhgawigaa (Low Cap Clan). Reba and her siblings grew up in the pre-Garrison Dam community of Independence, a place saturated in traditional Mandan and Hidatsa values and culture. Like many in her generation, Reba grew up speaking both Hidatsa and English.

Reba's mother, Mercy Baker Walker, was the daughter of Louis Baker and Emma Taylor, and was raised by her grandmother First Sprout and grandfather Two Chief, Reba's father, Hans Walker Sr., was the son of Joseph and Susie Walker Young Bird from the Lucky Mound community. Reba spoke often of the close relationship she and siblings enjoyed with their father, a rancher who also served his community on the Fort Berthold Tribal Council. Reba's mother sustained their family with her extensive gardens, delicious cooking, and wise guidance. She also taught Reba to be very organized, as she always had a large garden from which she would can and dry traditional foods. Reba recalled how her parents welcomed extended family and friends into their home, assuring their children knew their relatives and the traditional values embedded in those relationships. Reba had a particularly close relationship with her mother and wanted to be just like her. When her older siblings left for school, her mother would sit down at the table with her and let her drink coffee with milk in it. Once when the family sat around the table, her parents asked her what she wanted to be when she grew up. She answered, "I want to be a common woman, like Mama," and they all laughed. "But I was serious, I wanted to be just like my mom," she explained. Both parents supported their children to grow as individuals, Reba said, "They just let us be who we were; we didn't have to fit into a mold."

Reba's education began in the local Independence School and later moved to Mission School in Elbowoods ultimately graduating from Sanish High School. She then entered the nursing program at Montana State University-Bozeman. Organic chemistry was a challenge, especially after her professor quizzed her until she was able to recite how organic molecules were formed in complex chemical reactions. She relied on the values of hard work and organization learned from her parents, and earned the second highest score in the state of Montana when she sat for her nursing exams. Reba next worked for many years as a nurse all over the country~ Great Falls, Pittsburgh, Cape Cod, Denver and Tacoma. After leaving direct practice, she worked as an administrator at the University of South Dakota and Standing Rock's Sitting Bull College where she helped set up a nursing program to increase the number of Native nurses serving tribal communities. Reba also worked at Macalester College in Minnesota as the director of the Native American Program.

After returning home she worked in the planning office for the Three Affiliated Tribes, for Indian Health Service as s Service Unit Director and finally in the Planning and Legislation Office at the Indian Health Service Area Office level before she retired. In these roles, Reba always held the interests of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara and Native people at the center of her priorities, testifying before the U.S. Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs multiple times to document the health disparities, particularly regarding the need for increased care for diabetes. Reba was very active with her church the United Church of Christ, serving on the board of the Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM) for many years. Recently, she wrote a prayer used around the world for Indigenous People's Day by the United Church of Christ.

Even in retirement Reba kept busy, and spent many years antiquing in Mandan and Bismarck. She worked with the North Dakota State Historical Society on the preservation of sacred sites of the Mandan and Hidatsa, and in 2014 she and her sister Tillie bought and donated lands associated with the Knife River Hidatsa village site to the Three Affiliated Tribes. Reba took great pleasure in hosting family and friends in her house offering a beautiful spread of delicious and healthy foods. Over the course of her long, busy life, she exemplified traditional values of family and community. She demonstrated that she was, in fact, an uncommon woman, making important contributions in the critical areas of health policy, the environment, and cultural preservation for the wellbeing of American Indian communities across the U.S. She had a voice like a cupcake, and a will of iron.

Reba passed away on December 20, 2020, and is survived by her niece Leah Ann Walker, and nephews, Carey, Tom, and Reid Walker. She was preceded in death by her father Hans Walker, Sr., her mother Mercy Baker Walker, two brothers; Melvin Walker and Hans Walker Jr., and elder sister Tillie Walker.

In alignment with CDC guidelines, and to respect Reba's wishes as a lifelong health advocate, the family asks that mourners please stay home at this time to prevent the spread of COVID-19. A funeral will be held Saturday, December 26, 2020. No more than five members of Reba's immediate family and the senior pallbearer's family will be allowed in the viewing. This is to prevent COVID-19 spread. We know this is a very contagious airborne virus. Indoor gatherings are particularly risky. We ask that everyone stay in their cars. If you must leave your car, wear a mask and practice social distancing at all times.

As Reba would likely say, protecting your health is the priority, as we are all at risk and have others in our lives who depend on us. Those who would like to attend the burial, please stay in your cars. If you leave your car at the gravesite, wear a mask at all times and stay at least 6 feet away from others. Do not shake hands. We understand these practices are contrary to our traditional ways. We ask this of mourners because we want everyone to make it through these very difficult times with their health so we can be with each other after the pandemic is over. The family appreciates everyone's understanding and plans to gather for an appropriate memorial when it is safe to do so.

Harley Emerson (Taco) Pace, (Caci ihidi guhaq hush) Eagle Coming Up the Buttes, was born August 16, 1977, to Trudy Chase and Harley Pace at Cardston, Alberta Canada. Taco, as he was fondly known by family and friends, was a member of the Three Affiliated Tribes, MHA Nation, and a member of the Dripping Earth Clan and a child of the Low Cap Clan. He also had a second Nueta name, Ase Xte Shote– White Bighorn Sheep. Shortly after his birth, he moved to Mandaree where he was raised in the loving care of his magoo (great grandmother. Anna Fredericks Chase) and extended family; in particular, his grandfather, Emerson Chase and grandmother Theodora. It was these significant individuals that molded his character and can be credited for instilling strong family values that guided him throughout his life. Taco was fortunate to spend his childhood at the Chase ranch playing and hiking the surrounding badlands and following at the side of his grandpa Emerson embarking on daily adventures with him and his sidekicks. In his formative years there were other important male role models in his life. Cowboys who worked on the ranch and his uncle Bobby Brugh and in his teen years, his Clan father, Kenny Smith. Taco attended school at Mandaree and New Town and later completed his GED.
