Information For West Segment Elders



Happy New Year! Now we all have to get used to 2023!

Here is some information from the CDC Centers for Disease Control and Prevent.

Each year, millions of older people~those 65 and older~fall. In fact, more than one out of four older people falls each year, but less than half tell their doctor. Falling once doubles your chances of falling again.

Falls Are Serious and Costly:

- * One out of five falls causes a serious injury such as broken bones or a head injury.
- * Each year, 3 million older people are treated in emergency departments for fall injuries.
- * Over 800,000 patients a year are hospitalized because of a fall injury, most often because of a head injury or hip fracture.
- * Each year at least 300,000 older people are hospitalized for hip fractures.
- * More than 95% of hip fractures are caused by falling, usually by falling sideways.
- * Falls are the most common cause of traumatic brain injuries.
- * In 2015, the total medical costs for falls totaled more than \$50 billion. Medicare and Medicaid shouldered 75% of these costs.

What can Happen After a Fall?

Many do not cause injuries. But one out of five falls does cause a serious injury such as a broken bone or a head injury. These injuries can make it hard for a person to get around, do everyday activities, or live on their own.

- * Falls can cause broken bones, like wrist, arm, ankle, and hip fractures.
- * Falls can cause head injuries. These can be very serious, especially if the person is taking certain medicines (like blood thinners). An older person who falls and hits their head should see their doctor right away to make sure they don't have a brain injury.
- * Many people who fall, even if they're not injured, become afraid of falling. This fear may cause a person to cut down on their everyday activities. When a person is less active, they become weaker and this increases their chances of falling.

What Conditions Make You More Likely to Fall?

Research has identified many conditions that contribute to falling. These are called risk factors. Many risk factors can be changed or modified to help prevent falls. They include:

- * Lower body weakness

- * Vitamin D deficiency (that is, not enough vitamin D in your system)
- * Difficulties with walking and balance.
- * Use of medicines, such as tranquilizers, sedatives, or antidepressants. Even some over-the-counter medicines can affect balance and how steady you are on your feet.
- * Vision problems
- * Foot pain or poor footwear
- * Home hazards or dangers such as: broken or uneven steps and throw rugs or clutter that can be tripped over.

Most falls are caused by a combination of risk factors. The more risk factors a person has, the greater their chances of falling.

West Segment community member pictured here won a fire place entertainment center in the Door Prize Drawing.





First Week of the Sixty-eight Legislative Assembly of North Dakota

First week of the Sixty-eighth Legislative Assembly of North Dakota

Legislative Session began January 3 with ND Tribal Nations address at 10 am. Representative Jayme Davis and I escorted Turtle Mt. Chairman Azure in as the guest speaker to give the ND tribal nations address. Thank you, Chairman Azure, for your address, your words are inspiring.

It has been exciting to meet so many people as I'm learning the process of creating bills and researching Century Code. It has been an excellent learning experience as I navigate through the different agencies that assist in bill creation.

I have been selected to serve on Ag committee and the Tax and Finance Committee. My first choice was to serve on the Natural Resources and Energy committee but was not selected. Meeting and working alongside my Republican counterparts have been a good experience, I have been welcomed to these committees and look forward to building good relationships 'across the aisle.'

I was elected by the MHA people to represent the MHA people. It is my core belief that we must protect our future generations, that belief is rooted at the very foundation of the work that I have set out to do. I believe that if we work together, we will make progress and find the solutions that are needed to build the quality of life that we all deserve.

During my tenure, I hope to meet with all tribal leadership. This first week, I have tried to schedule a meeting with chairman Mark Fox and will continue to reach out to his office. I also introduced myself to the ND Indian Affairs Director, Nathan Davis. Last week, Chairman Fox and Director Davis met in the early am on a bill regarding water rights. I was unaware of this bill and hope that I will be included in these discussions in the future. I hope that the lobbyists for our tribes reach out to Representative Davis and I so, we know where we can focus our efforts if they wish.

I am currently researching to introduce bills on childcare, mental health, and behavior counselors in our tribal schools,

and air quality monitoring. Governor Burgum has named a few of these topics to include in his initiatives. I look forward to seeing what kind of specific actions he intends to take.

I have been asked to co-sponsor multiple bills. The bills I am looking at I am still researching and meeting with people who may be experts in the respective fields. We were given the suggestion of running up to 3 bills since we are freshman legislators.

In Governor Burgum's address I felt that he had a lot of hope and excitement for the oil and gas industry in North Dakota. I hope as we move forward, both Representative Davis and I will be able to introduce our ideas and the beliefs that we hold as Native people that promote environmental protections. He also mentioned food security but, I would hope that he considers to have healthy food, we need to have clean water, clean air, and clean soil.

I believe the initiatives that I am taking on as a freshman legislator are important to our people. I will continue to work with State agencies to discuss the need for legislation to protect our people and way of life.



I Hope You Like Cheeseburgers!



I hope you like Cheeseburgers because I do! "L.O.L". In fact, my favorite burger to order is a cheeseburger deluxe! That's a burger with cheese, lettuce, pickles, onions, tomatoes, and mayo - with ketchup on the side. The beef patty can't be too small, and the bun can't be too big either.

My question for you is, don't you wish every time you ordered your burger you got it just the way you wanted it? I sure do. We all know that life is not like burger king, and our prayers to God are not either. In other words, God is not burger king, we don't always have it our way! The reality of life has a way of rearing its ugly head - through our personal health, our finances, our relationships, our jobs, even our successes and failures. All these events - past, present, and future - make up our life. They can fill us with either excitement and hope, or with despair, shame, and guilt.

I've had talks with friends, family, and strangers on how to pray and what to ask for when praying. They have warned, don't pray to ask for patience or you will be put in those situations where your patience will be tested. His years of life reflect his love for his family and the importance he placed on prayer and spirituality. Leland DuBois started sun dancing in Green Grass, South Dakota under grandpa Frank Fools Crow and was a staff carrier for the Water Buster Clan until the present time.
