



West Segment Employees Attend Wellness Training



This workshop on Wellness took place for the West Segment employees as well as for the West Segment Educators. On May 19-20 and 21st at the Water Chief Hall in Mandaree. Before they started presenting, Kasey started off by taking smudge around in the room.

The presenter were as follows:

Levi Horn/ Former NFL Player, Addiction Counselor. He currently resides in Spokane, Washington he is a member of the Northern Cheyenne Reservation. He considers himself an Urban Native. He was a former NFL player for the Chicago Bears. Presently, he is an Addiction Counselor. During his presentation Levi talked about failure his own failure by missing a full scholarship in Oregon because he wasn't concentrating on his goal. He shared when he was on the NFL team he was signing autographs. As Levi states; "it was hard for people to believe that I played NFL when I was signing autographs this one guy had me prove I was an NFL player, he knew I had a scar an that's what he wanted to see in order for me to prove I was a NFL player. I showed him the scar than only than did he believe me."

Kasey Nicholson/Wellness Educator/Comedian. Before they even started Kasey lit some smudge and went around an smudged everyone. After he smudge, he talked about being himself being stuck and being in his own head. He did a lot in his life spiritually but at that time he still wasn't happy, he also spoke about not being open minded. He is originally from the Fort Belknap Reservation in Montana, he is from the Gros Venture tribe. He currently lives in Billings, Montana. Kasey considers himself a nomadic person, he moved around a lot in his life time.

Chance Rush/EmCee, Motivational Speaker/Actor/Comedian. Thanked everyone for being here told everyone its good to be home. I am Hidatsa, I currently live in Dallas, Texas with my wife and our seven children. Every year my mom made sure I came back here once a year. After that, I made a point to come home.

Chance also shares when he was here in New Town, he went to Edwin Loe Elementary school where he clearly remembers being bullied there. He also mentioned he worked with Jaret Baker at the youth center. As he said; "What I learned was to do my best, I learned that standard, we had fitness, wellness and each other. Every person in this room are front line people. We are all going to leave a legacy. We are targeted the most because we have a lot of resources. This morning I felt good. What type of leader are you going to be? One of the things I love about MHA is they're positive and wanting to be the best. I was really excited about coming back home. What does you culture, your DNA, prayer, songs and language do everyday. My last name belongs to my children, you work for your name, take a stand on who you are and who your family is. My dad Don said to me Chance you have something good to say. This morning I went for my run I ran on the bridge and I stood there and prayed and asked for protection of everyone, my bothers, our children and everyone. We're right in it right now, remain spiritual, my dad always told me you have to have a purpose to tell your story. Your employment should have meaning behind it. Be your own motivator, when you become used to doing what your doing it becomes a way of life for you. Whatever you got going on in your life, your already there.

Our purpose here is to strengthen your work force, this is what is needed here in this community so you can serve your people better."

Our first presenter was Kasey Nicolson, MS, Comedian & Wellness Educator. He spoke about MOVED.

Motivation: Doesn't last a long time; very short term.

- Kasey mentioned he had to deal with his past, his trauma, abandonment issues, he was doing his job but had no joy in it.

He mentioned he had chances to go to other colleges, but was used to his own safety. He states; 'Are you doing things because they said you have too? Or your going to do this and that and you don't question it; we can't make anyone happy. You have to be happy, you have to be open to your own happiness".

Evolve: is to be the person you want if you can't then you have to work on your issues. It's up to you to want to make changes in your life. Make changes. Change is good, our body is Kasey Nicholson give changing as we speak. Your his presentation to West body is fighting sicknesses right Segment employees. now all of this is evolving its up



to you. You have to become the person you wants to. Keep moving forward. We have opportunities to help our people its all up to you.



- Muscle/joint aches
- Pink eye

IF YOUR CHILD HAS SYMPTOMS OF COVID-19:

- Call 911 or visit ER if your child is experiencing shortness of breath, fever, cough, diarrhea, vomiting, or stomachache
- If your child experiencing any of the other symptoms, consider seeing a healthcare provider and be <u>tested for COVID-19</u>. CDC recommends all people with symptoms of COVID-19, including children, get tested.
- Notify your child's school that your child is sick. Also inform the school if your child has had a COVID-19 test and what the result is, if available.
- Protect yourself from COVID-19 while caring for your sick child by wearing a mask, washing your hands frequently, monitoring yourself for symptoms for COVID-19, and using other preventive measures.

The Indian Citizenship of 1924 By Todd Hall May 29, 2021

Lately, the National media has been discussing and proclaiming a new National Holiday to the American people, Juneteenth, also known as Freedom Day, Jubilee Day, Liberation Day, and Emancipation Day. It originated in Galveston, Texas on June 19, 1865 when Union Army General Gordon Granger, proclaimed the end of slavery in the most remote State of the Union, Texas. The holiday in its present form, celebrates the emancipation of those who had been enslaved in the United States. This action, eventually led to the passage of the 14th Amendment (1868) of the United States Constitution which states: "All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. " and the 15th Amendment (1870) which states: "The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude." While these were landmark cases of legislation and were shining examples of America's ambitious pursuit of "Life, liberty, and justice for all", it was not the case for our loved ones who had to endure much hardship and suffering before we were afforded the same opportunities as the rest of America. We endure many of those same struggles to this day. But that is another story for another day. It was not until June 2, 1924 when President Calvin Coolidge signed into law, The Indian Citizenship Act, also known as the Snyder Act, were all Native American Indian people granted full United States citizenship. The First Americans were the last to be recognized as United States citizens. If that is not a case of sad irony, I do not know what is. But even though the act granted our people U.S. citizenship, it did not ensure our relatives the basic right to vote. It was not until 1962, when New Mexico became the last State in the Union to pass legislation guaranteeing its Native American Indian citizens the right to vote that it can be said that "Native American Indians are guaranteed the right to vote in the United States of America"..... 1962!!!!! The Indian Citizenship Act was said to have passed to be, for the most part, as a tribute to the Native American Indian Warriors who fought and helped the United States to secure victory in

World War 1. This is where the legislation becomes personal to me. Let me explain: One of the greatest warriors I have ever met in my lifetime was a World War 1 combat veteran. I remember only meeting him once, as he stood proud, in full regalia wearing a War Bonnet and sunglasses. He was addressing the Nux Baga, speaking Hidatsa, in the style which the old ones talked, not one word of English. I was just a little fart but remember like it was yesterday. That is the day he introduced me to the people, me and my sister Sherry. We became "People" that day, getting our "Real Names" and he brought us in to his and our Grandfather, James (Iron Bear) Hall's clan. They brought us in, I was told, so when we cross-over, we will know our own people on the other side, we would not be orphans, so to speak, wandering aimlessly, searching. My point in telling all of this is, it was not really that long ago! My own life has intersected with one of the great men that made it possible that we might survive as Tribal Nations here on Turtle Rock. Yes I am "getting long in the tooth but I am not a gummer yet" as we say down on Route 17W. On June 2nd, please remember folks like Grandpa Charley Fox. He is the man I was talking about. I am sure if he were here and heard me telling all of this, he would probably say he was not trying to change the world, that he was only doing his duty, as a soldier, a warrior, and a Hidatsa. He would tell us that we "matter" each and every one of us. We must all do our best so that our people shall not perish into a faded memory. It doesn't make a difference whether we are a teacher, rancher, custodian, or any occupation that contributes to the wellbeing of our people, we all matter. The struggles will be many, but cherish the good times, always remember the old ways and honor the sacred. We are living history just as he did. Most of all, we must make full use of our United States Citizenship, and vote, our future depends on it.

The Year of St. Joseph



From time to time, usually when an anniversary of some event happens, the Pope will ask Catholics to take a year and ponder upon the influence this anniversary has had on the Church or on the World. Last year, in his Apostolic Letter titled Patris Corde ("With a Father's Heart") dated December 8, 2020, Pope Francis declared December 8th, 2020 through December 8th, 2021 a year to reflect upon St. Joseph, the

Husband of Mary. The anniversary he had in mind was the 150th anniversary (December 8, 1870) of when Blessed Pope Pius IX declared St. Joseph to be the Patron Saint of the Universal Church. ("Patron" here means St. Joseph will pray for and watch over the Church Jesus established.) Pope Francis, hunkered down under the Covid-19 pandemic along with the entire world, saw this as an opportunity to give "ordinary" people, "those who appear hidden or in the shadows" hope in time of darkness. "Each of us can discover in Joseph ... a support and a guide in times of trouble."

Very little is known about St. Joseph. Scripture records no words from St. Joseph's mouth but does reveal how he responded to God's grace. God could speak to St. Joseph in dreams and he unquestionably responded "yes" and took Mary to be his wife and Jesus to be his son. As a husband he said "yes" to protect Mary and Jesus from King Harrod, accepting hardships and a long trip into Egypt and back. As a Foster Father he said "yes" to raise Jesus as his own, just as any father would do in the first century who taught his son all the necessary skills to function in society – manners, social skills, a work ethic, business practices, prayers, worship, reading, writing and the like.

Other characteristics about St. Joseph can be inferred from these actions. Traveling to Egypt and back, St. Joseph probably was young, strong and robust. To be able to hear God in dreams, St. Joseph had to have a strong close relationship with God. To be willing to promptly say "yes" after he woke from his dream, St. Joseph had a strong faith in and love for God. By following the census initiated by King Harrod, St. Joseph was a righteous lawabiding citizen. By following Jewish traditions of presenting Jesus to God in the Temple and offering a pair of Turtle Doves as their offering to God, St. Joseph was a pious and righteous man. His love for God enabled him to greatly love his wife and her son. His obedience to God allowed him to suffer silently and willingly accept his role. His silence in scriptures reveals St. Joseph's humbleness. There are so many more characteristics we can infer from his actions. It's up to you to discover them. Take some time to ponder what kind of a man God would call to be the husband to Mary, the Mother of God, the Foster Father of His Only Begotten Son. Reflect on what it would be like to live with

the Mother of God, to talk with someone so pure and holy, so beautiful, to hear her voice, to see her smile, to observe her prayerfulness, to feel her genuineness. Reflect on what it was like to touch the face of God, to cradle the Father's only begotten Son in your arms, to experience the first time he took a step, to hear the first words out of his mouth, to watch him explore the world as a toddler, to help him navigate the teenage years.

Take serious this "Year of St. Joseph" that Pope Francis has initiated. As you learn more about St. Joseph you will learn more how to courageously handle today's world just as St. Joseph courageously handled his world.

In 1994, he met his partner of seventeen years, Ronelle Bruce, together, they had two sons, Ryan III and William.

In 2009, they became the parents of their adopted baby girl, Amaya. He was very proud of his kids and loved them dearly.

His beginning years of life, he was a ranch hand. By the age of fourteen he started his passion operating heavy equipment with his dad, Rhine.

Throughout his life he worked numerous jobs, but operating a scraper was his passion. Growing up, he climbed towers in Iowa and did seismography in Minot, North Dakota.
