going on this month and Easter is just around the corner.







2023 District 15 Boys Basketball Tournament at Mandarge School

Although it wasn't the actual first time Mandaree hosted a District basketball tournament, it was the first time they were able to host the tournament in their very own school. What was a bittersweet ending to the last district 15 basketball tournament as we have known for years, the North Dakota High School Athletic Board approved a new three-class basketball system this coming fall, that terminates District #15 and puts Mandaree Basketball in district #6.

After weeks of planning by Mandaree School Athletics Director Elmer Flying Horse Sr., along with staff, faculty, students and the West Segment office, Mandaree hosted a magnificent tournament that would be talked about by many in a positive way for weeks to follow. Basketball fans came from near and far to see their fight their way to the Regional Tournament to be held at the 4 Bears Event Center.

There was delicious food for our visitors to enjoy and the food was sold by several different classes and student council throughout the weekend. The Young Bucks' Traveling Team played during half time, the Mandaree School Drum was on hand to sing for the dance

Group's Debut Performances. The Mandaree Warriors Cheerleader's Dance Routine, and our very honorable military Posts carrying in our flags, VFW 9061and Myron B. Johnson/ Nathan Good Iron Post 271, the Mandaree Community facilitated all of this that was very entertaining in making this a successful tournament.

The 2023 District #15 Championship title would go to the Warriors of White Shield. They went into the tournament seated #1 and would prove their standings right as they earned themselves a first round bye, then downed Alexander in the semifinals 59-37 and defeated the Trenton Tigers 60-52 to capture a well-deserved District 15 Championship Title. Head Coach Shaun Knife said his team's goal was to go undefeated in the district play. After squeaking out of the districts last season he said he knew his team had more talent and was better than that. Senior Jace Dickens became Coach Knife's first athlete to surpass their 1000 points mark, who he says stepped up to the challenges and performed well in District play.

District 15 Coach of the Year also went to Warriors' Coach Shaun Knife as he shared this award with Parshall Braves Head Coach Kolby Rabbit Head. Knife states; I owe all the credit to the people who were there to support me from day one. From the school board to the Administration to the players and to my family for sacrificing their time to help me. Coach of the year comes from my students/athletes showing up and being ready. None of it was possible without their hard work and determination to win games.

Our Mandaree Warriors broke a three-year streak of missing the Region 8 Basketball Tournament to finish in 4th place in the District 15 Tournament beating out the Newtown Eagles 55-43 in the semifinal round and out scoring Alexander 69-61 in the consolation game to keep their season alive and advance to the Region 8 Tournament. Although Mandaree was seated last in the district they showed everyone what their goal was, to make this year's regionals.

Parshall Braves who is co-op with North Shore Plaza would beat Mandaree the first round 60-45, have a bye the semifinal round and take on the Williston Trinity Christian Crusaders in the consolation round, but were ousted by the Crusaders 57-53 bringing the Braves season to an end.

I joined the U.S. Army on December 28, 1958 at Abilene, Texas. I was then taken to Fort Carson Colorado, after two days at Fort Carson I was put on a airplane and flown to Fort Benning, Georgia. After basic, I went to Fort Rucker, Alabama for helicopter training. Then I was sent to Fort Sam in Houston, Texas for combat and medical training. 

The North Dakota 68th Legislative Assembly

On 3-10-23 HCR 3028 Spill Study on ND state highways within the boundaries of Ft. Berthold Reservation failed in the House, 17 yes and 72 nays. Thank you to all of the house democrats and the four house republicans who supported. The House Energy and Natural Resources committee said that it was on Ft. Berthold Reservation so it is the federal government that we need to work with (this was told to them by ND Legislative Council who helped write HCR 3028). Prior to the House Energy and Natural Resources committee voting on this study in their committee and before House vote on 3-10-23, I tried to get Chairman to support. Was told even if he did it would have not mattered.

This was one of my campaign plat forms. I was not disappointed. Now the House and the people of ND know the need for this spill study. I will continue to work find solutions. I did write a statement prior to the House voting on HCR 3028 here its is below:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker,

HCR 3028 is to study spills for a baseline study on state Highways on Ft. Berthold Reservation from oil and gas development with the assistance from DEQ who works close with EPA. I would like to say that I am not against oil and gas it has brought much prosperity to Ft. Berthold Reservation and North Dakota. 15 years ago, my grandmother was brought a oil and gas lease to sign from group of people with oil and gas. Prior to her signing I asked them what's going to happen to environment and what about reclamation, remediation? The oil and gas people said we will take of the environment if anything happens. As the years pasted and spills occurred I kept asking questions and no one seemed to know what to do. My tribe did not know either because we are taught to take care of the earth.

This baseline study will educate and give the knowledge to our future generations and the people who live on Ft. Berthold Reservation for a better understanding of the environmental impacts of vegetation, soil, water quality, insects, and all species of domestic and wild animals and to finding solutions.

3-2-23 my resolution HCR 3027 failed on the house floor but we can do an mou with dot. Working with lobbyist. Fegley from district 4B voted no. Important to note he is from district 4.

3-2-23 resolution/study HCR 3027 safety corridors on state highways within Fort Berthold Reservation was heard by House Transportation Committee. I introduced this bill to address the need for safety on state hwys within Fort Berthold Reservation and to ensure DOT follows through with their plan because it's been 15 years of oil and gas traffic impact while all the other communities surrounding Fort Berthold Reservation have received their safety corridors 8 years ago. Wendy Wells, Rosie White Owl, Charlie Vigen, and Sherry Turner-Lone Fight gave testimony in their support of HCR 3027.

Later in the afternoon House Transportation committee voted for a do not pass motioned by Representative Murphy who stated he asked law enforcement who said they aren't enforcing it so this bill won't change that. DOT said they did millions in work and there are funds and plans to do much of what has been requested and this bill wouldn't move things faster. You can view HCR 3027 in its entirety on North Dakota Legislative Assembly website. Thank you, Wendy, Rosie, Charlie, and Sherry, for

testifying in support of HCR 3027! Representative Lisa Finley-DeVille

HCR 3027 a study in consultation with the ND Department of Transportation, needed safety improvements to State Highways within the boundaries of Fort Berthold Reservation was voted anonymously and failed on 3-6-23 in the House with 35 yes (I only got the 35 yes and not the no votes). Representative Murphy was the Energy and Natural Resources committee bill carrier. Who stated that he visited with MHA nations law enforcement who should be enforcing the laws on oil and gas vehicles and that ND DOT has a plan and lots of money has already been allocated to the state highways on Ft. Berthold.

The next day I followed up with representative Murphy on his statement that he visited with MHA law enforcement and Safety officer who should be enforcing laws on oil and gas vehicles. Murphy was visiting with the wrong MHA departments.

I will continue to find solutions that our state highways on Ft. Berthold Reservation are safe.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HCR 3027 was introduced because for 13 years North Dakotans living within the exterior boundaries of the MHA Nation, school buses, parents and grandparents transporting their children or grandchildren to and from school and first responders have been at high risk for collisions involving oil and gas vehicles on state highways within the Fort Berthold Reservation. DOT does have a plan for round a bouts for junction 22 and 73 and junction 23 and 8, yet it does not fully address safety needs for state highways within MHA Nation.

State Highways on Fort Berthold Reservation are managed and funded by the state. Bureau of Indian Affairs roads on Fort Berthold Reservation are funded and managed by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The MHA Nation manages and funds its community roads on Fort Berthold Reservation. This bill is needed because two months ago an elementary school age child was hit by a semi-truck while crossing the walk way on state highway 23 at Bakersfield to get on the school bus. The child survived but suffers extensive injuries from which recovery is unknown. The semi-truck driver said he did not see the child. The location of this accident is not addressed in the current dot plan.

Mr. Speaker, may I continue? Members of the house I want to emphasize the relationship between MHA Nation and the State of ND is good. MHA Nation is supportive of energy production and I want assure the safety of North Dakotans living in the Bakken oil and gas formation and the people who work there. I urge you to vote green.






