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

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Largest North Dakota Wild Fire Burns Many Acres of land on Route 17

This wild fire was horrendous when I drove out there as I got closer you could smell the smoke from the wild fire. As you can see in the photo above where it's all black is where the wild fire burned. Many community members took it upon themselves to take photos of the wild fire while it was burning. This wild fire took it's toll on our Mandaree Volunteer Fire fighters they were out there all the time day and night fighting this wild fire. The State of North Dakota is in a dry drought this year so that didn't help at all and when it became windy outside the wild fires took off more and burned more land out on route 17. According to Fire Chief Marle Baker, he said on Saturday night about 10 miles south of Mandaree the wild fires were about 75% contained. Two black hawk helicopter's from South Dakota were on hand to help, they left on Monday, May 3rd. It rained and that helped out but it turned the soil into slick clay making it difficult for crews to make it to parts of the

wild fire so they had to go on foot. At that time Baker stated, this wild fire burned about 8,000 acres of land by route 17 had grown to 9,800 acres. According to Baker he hopes to have a 95% containment by the end of Tuesday, May 5th. According to authorities, they suspect a burning coal seam was the cause of this wild fire.

I was curious because I don't know what a coal seam is so here is it: A coalseam fire is a burning of an outcrop or underground coal seam. Most coalseam fires exhibit smoldering combustion, particularly underground coal-seam fires, because of limited atmospheric oxygen availability. Coalseam fire instances on earth date back several million years. So now we know what a coal-seam is. See press release on page 4 will give more information.



Incident Tyle and Level: Wildfire, Type III

Date/Time Detected: May 1, 2021, 2:30 PM CST

Cause of Origin: Under Investigation

Location: 10 miles South of Mandaree, ND, South of BIA Road 17 and on the north side of the Missouri River.

Resources: 5-type 6 Engines (TAT Fire Management), 4-Type 6 Engines (ND Forest Service), 3-Type 6 Engines (U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service), 1-Structure Engine (Mandaree Volunteer Fire Department), 3-Type 6 Engines (Killdeer Fire Department), 1-Fixed Wing Air Observation (ND Civil Air Patrol), 1-Dozer (TAT Roads), 3-BlackHawk Helicopters (SD Air National Guard), 5-Overhead, 55-Total Personnel.

Type of Burning/Fuel Type: Grass, Brush, Juniper, Ash, Oak and Aspens.

Terrain: Steep, rugged hills and ravines, the majority of which is inaccessible by vehicles.

Size: 9,803 Acres (Estimated)

Containment: 100% (There will be continue to some active interior burning for 2-3 weeks)

Jurisdiction: Tribal/BIA

Primary Agency: Three Affiliated Tribes Fire Management.

Other Agency Response: Mandaree Volunteer Fire Department, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, North Dakota Forest Service, Killdeer Fire Department, MHA Emergency Operations Center, Dunn County Sheriff's Office, Mandaree EMS, Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Supporting Agencies: West Segment Security, West Segment Rural Water, TAT Roads, TAT Maintenance.

Fire Activity: Resources immediately conducted back burn operations and were used throughout the incident to successfully contain the fire. Mop up operations along fire perimeter is continuing with limited hot spots being found. Back burn sites were effective in reinforcing dozer lines and roads. Active torching and burning continues in residual fuels. Interior burning is expected to last for an additional 2 weeks. Resources will remain on scene to monitor containment perimeter and interior burning.

Overall Weather Conditions: Extreme Drought Conditions and subsequent Fire Weather (Red Flag) Warnings, Hot, Dry, Windy Conditions will contribute to the burning of residual fuels. Potential precipitation this upcoming weekend should help fire crews on the site with mop up operations.

Structures Lost/Damaged: 1 unoccupied mobile home.

Injuries: None

Smoke Visible From: Smoke from residual fuel is expected to be visible from BIA 14, BIA 17, North Dakota Highway 22, and Mandaree area for the next 2 weeks.

Closure/Evacuations: Evacuations were implemented for local oil field locations in the incident area during initial fire run. No Evacuations or Road Closures were needed upon completion of dozer lines and burn out. There is no threat to lives or property at this time.

Here you can see a white tail deer on the burnt land. I also seen an antelope run across the road from me.




In this area where trees are burned you can see smoldering smoke.

Elder Mary Finley is pictured here having fun playing bingo.



Honoring Unique Mother's



I thought of honoring some mothers from West Segment who have worked hard all their lives. I realize there are a lot of mothers out there who have worked hard all their lives to, but this lady amazed me and even more so with her beautiful picture shown here to your left. I would have never seen this portrait if I didn't ask her for it. Her name is Ethel Marie Baker Reeves, she was born on November 2,

1937. What makes her so unique is she served in the armed forces. Her given Indian name is "Everybody Looks At her" she was named after her grandmother Ethel Tail Baker. According to Ethel she says; "My name was transferred to me by Iris Bird Bear after I retired in 1995 from the government after thirty five years." Ethel has been happily married to William Aaron Reeves for the past sixty- one years they were both blessed with one daughter Delia Howling Wolf and three sons; Delvin, William the second and Philip James. Ethel and her husband are the grandparents of seventeen grandchildren and fourteen great-grandchildren.

Ethel joined the service when she was nineteen years old, she explains; "I decided to join the service because I had uncles and relatives who were in the service. I had a scholarship to go to school and I only lasted one week. I decided then school was not for me so that's when I made the decision to go into the service. While I was in the service I worked in personnel, shipping soldiers in and out of Fort Lee, Virginia I loved my job. While I was in the service I was stationed at Ft. McClellan, Alabama and Ft. Lee Virginia. I loved working at Ft. Lee.

I asked Ethel if she was treated any differently being a woman at the time when she was in the service, as she replied; "I was not treated any differently. I loved everything about the service there wasn't anything negative. I think going to boarding school at an early age helped me to be on my own. I already knew how to make a bed!".

Ethel fell in love with Virginia she loved the weather out there and most of all her job. "My MOS Military Occupational Specialty was Personnel.

When she did go into the service, she didn't recall anything major going on in our world at that time she left for the service. I asked her what was the biggest change in our world today and with that in mind I can say we all agree that her answer was Covid. She states; "There were so many deaths due to Covid on our reservation.

Being one of our prominent elders in our West Segment community I asked Ethel what her advice would be to us as a people. " I feel we should teach our children how we were raised, how we were taught. Mostly about our Indian ways of life. The main thing I see our children need to be taught most is respect, what that means and how to respect others. We need to keep on carrying on our ways. My other advice would be to work hard at what you want to do in your life.

As we visited, I asked Ethel what were some of the things she enjoyed doing with her family and relatives and what were some of the things she missed. As she replies; "I enjoy getting together at pow wows and birthdays and Church with my family. I an my husband enjoy our grandchildren and being able to be with them. We are so happy that my children are home with us from Maryland. What I miss most is my parents and my brothers, I miss them every day".



Today Ethel and her husband William enjoy their family time and currently reside in our West Segment Community after living away for many years. They enjoy going to events such as pow wows, community events that go on in our West Segment community. They enjoy traveling to New Town or Parshall for

family birthday dinners. They both spend as much time as they can with their family and relatives, they are a very active couple.

At home Ethel and William are active and involved in 271 and 9061 Posts here on our reservation. You can bet you will see this woman along side her husband this Memorial Day when they're both out there decorating the graves of military relatives and other military soldiers by putting small American flags out.

I would like to thank Ethel for allowing me to print her information which was provided by her. I appreciate the time she took to answer the questions I had for her. She is one amazing unique lady for sure. I recently seen Ethel and William at the Little Shell war bonnet dance in New Town to support their family and relatives. It gave me a good happy feeling to see them both there. Again, I want to say thank you Ethel for sharing your unique story with us here in West Segment.

Honoring Unique Mother's



This unique woman was raised with strong family traditions. She is a very unique woman indeed who has an amazing background. Here is what she has to share. Greetings, all my friends and relatives: (Maadaa~nuxbaa~gaa~oo). My name is Katherine (NMI) Young Bear, I come from the "Young Bear, Benson and Bearsghost" families. A11 these families are from the Three Affiliated Tribes. thereby making me and my

family bona-fide members of Fort Berthold. I was blessed with two Native names; "Owl Woman" and "Iron Woman". When I came home on leave one time, my mother had her mother's name passed to me. My grandmother's name was, Alice Bearsghost- "Owl Woman". The late and honorable, Carrie Reynolds; gave back to me, my grandmother's name. It was after I completed many years of Sun Dancing, that I was given my grandmother's name; on my father's side, her name. "Iron Woman".

When I was a child, it was "instilled" in me that this United States of American belongs to us, Native Americans; and moverover the Hidatsa and Nueta. Throughout my life I have seen my family members enlist into the military and serve our country; my family has been in every war, struggle and fight, that the United States decides to get into. My grandfather, Mr. Walter Young Bear, gave the "Ultimate Sacrifice", his life, for all the Freedoms we enjoy today!

So, to enlist into the military for me, came natural, I always wanted to do my part to keep our Democracy in tact and help to ensure that there is "justice for all"! When I enlisted into the United States Air Force, I had two little sons. In spite of this fact, I proceeded to join the military and once I was out of Basic Training, I was able to take my sons with me. But due to the fact that I had dependents, I was not easily deployable. At that time, the Air Force was taking only single Airmen/Airwomen that had no dependents overseas. Therefore, I was stationed stateside.

Once I was honorably discharged from the United States Air Force, I went to college. Being a single Native American mother, it not easy. Since my college was in a white, racist, town-there were no jobs for me. No one wanted to hire this brown woman and I had boys to raise, cloth and educate. So I re-enlisted into

the military, the Army this time. There is a lot of stigma of women in the military, but my strong advice to young females today is, "join and serve". The military builds character. As mentioned I have two sons. I raised two of my grandchildren, one child from each of my sons. My two grandchildren were abandoned by their mothers, and I did not want my grandchildren in the 'systems', so I raised them. They ate what I provided, they learned their culture and traditions, and both graduated. My father always instilled in us, "you never abandon your children and grandchildren." This kind of thinking was told and instilled to all of us Young Bear's. Two things as far as changes go, that I see is the blatant disrespect to our democracy. That Trump character attempted to tear down the respect and honor that our Flag and our democracy stands for. And when he)Trump) did that, all their Racism came to light. I strongly feel that was as, bona fide people from this land, United States; it is time we let our voices be heard, whatever platform we choose to do it. Do it. In honor of this Memorial Day for those that gave the Ultimate Sacrifice, I thank you all you (knowing that a simple "thank you" will never be enough!) and pray that those of us that are still here, remember how fragile our Democracy really is; and that we make sure our Democracy stays in tact for generations to come! I would like to acknowledge my older sister Shirley (Bitsy) Hunter, who was in Navy she served during the Viet Nam conflict. Presently, she resides in Rapid City, South Dakota. She was honorably discharged



Veteran from the United States Navy. Today I live in Mandaree out in the country where I enjoy my home. I love practicing my culture which includes sweats and ceremonies. I also take pleasure in doing my crafts I enjoy sewing, and making star quilts, I also make many other items as well. In closing, I am very grateful that I came from a very "traditional and knowledgeable family" when it

comes to our Hidatsa and Nueta culture and values I attempt to practice them daily".

On behalf of the West Segment News, I would like to thank Katherine for allowing me to print her information which was provided by her. I appreciate the time she took to answer the questions and allowing me to put her beautiful service picture in our paper. She certainly is a very unique woman who enlisted twice in the service, and is very knowledgeable in our culture and traditions.

Danks is 2020 NDHSRA State Champion Inductee





If your into rodeo's than this young man is no stranger. His name is Daylon Danks, his parents are Shanna Danks and Cory Wilkie. Daylon was blessed with an Indian name given to him by his grandfather he named him "Comes Thunder". Daylon was raised by his grandparents Clayton and Paula Danks. He started riding when he was four years old and he's been riding ever since. As he replies; "My parents strongly encouraged me to get into rodeos to keep me from getting into trouble and from alcohol and drugs. They encouraged me to

keep my focus on rodeo and my school work. When I first started to rodeo I was nine years old and I kept on going where I could earn my own money. I first started in break away roping and moved on from there. My parents took me to Indian rodeos when I first started then when I was in junior high and high school I participated in rodeo clubs when I went to school in Killdeer".

Presently, Daylon is a freshman at the Miles City Community College in Miles City, Montana where he will major in Ag Production and is very active in their rodeo club. As he goes onto say; "I had a choice to go to Kansas or Miles City, I got a letter from the rodeo coach in Miles City who invited me to check out their college. So I chose Miles City because they had a phenomenal rodeo coach, his name is Chris Witcher. Plus Miles City is closer to home and I can easily drive home for holidays or breaks when I'm not busy".

In being a part of the rodeo club Daylon states; "they do an annual bash, which is a part of their fundraising event which is usually held in February but due to covid they had their bash this past March. As he explains; "We team up together and practice and get ready to travel to rodeos. In my rig, we have our own people and it's pretty much set in stone, so there's myself and my team roping partner Blaine Hiben and three other guys we all travel together and go to rodeos".

During his time in traveling the rodeo circuit Daylon was off to a great start. He made it to the INFR Indian National Finals Rodeo three times in row. His biggest accomplishment right now happened in his freshman year in making it to the CNFR, College National Finals Rodeo to be held in Casper, Wyoming in June. As Daylon goes onto say; "There are so many good ropers here in the Big Sky region that I compete against and I came out 3rd, the top two guys had it sealed for 1st and 2nd I just had to do my part, there's a lot of good talent out there and they take it really good. Making it to the CNFR my freshman year is one of my biggest accomplishments by far.

The College National Finals Rodeo will be in Casper, Wyoming in June. I asked Daylon how he felt when he found out he was going to the Nationals. As he replied; "I was pretty amazed when I found out I qualified, I get to compete against some of the best ropers in the region.

I could not have done this without my family and friends, they pushed me to do my best. and when I need advice I go to my rodeo coach and my grandpa Clayton, whose been roping for a long time, he helps me out all the time. My aunt Megan Danks, she been roping for a long time too and she's phenomenal. So these are the people I turn to for advice when I need it".

Daylon will soon be done with his freshman year at Miles City Community College and will return in

plans to travel more this summer to Indian rodeos, his goal is to qualify for the calf roping category in the


Indian National Finals Rodeo. He just wants to hang out with his family. Daylon lives out in the country on BIA route 14 in Mandaree with his grandparents.

Their parents are Luke Yeahquo and Jennifer (Johnson) Yeahquo. The young men are the youngest of four kids, they have an older sister and older brother. Their grandparents on their dad's side are the late Luke Yeahquo Sr., and Mary Jane (Fredericks) Yeahquo. On their mother's side their grandparents are the late Jarret Johnson and Ginger Anderson.

These two young men have been riding and rodeoing since they were just little boys. According to LJ he states; I and my brother JC team rope together my brother is the header and I am the heeler. I am a student at Western Oklahoma State in Altus, Oklahoma where I am majoring in Business administration, I graduated on May 14, 2021. 






Agenda items are due to the board by the 2nd to last Friday of the month before the meeting. 




