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One Impressive Veterans Life



This man hardly needs an introduction he is very well known everyone on Fort Berthold. He is one of the most active and a well respected Veteran community member have. He's a quiet and kind hearted man, who will help

anyone in need, without expecting something in return. When he is called upon, he is right there to help in any way he can. He has worked all his life and is still working today. His English name is James Garman Johnson, he is known to everyone as Jimmy. He was given his Indian name "Swift Eagle" by old lady Antelope in Lucky Mound. He was born on December 17, 1939 at the hospital in Elbowoods, North Dakota to Melvin and Eloise (Mandan) Johnson. "There was nine of us in our family, and now there's four of us left. I and my wife Roseann have five children, we currently live here in Mandaree. Today I have sixteen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

When we were young, we all looked up to someone in our lives, so I asked Jimmy, who he looked up to and who that person was that taught him a lot. As Jimmy replies; "the one I would say that had a lot of influence on me when I was growing up would be my uncle Bernard Mandan. You know he taught me a lot; my uncle Bernard seen a lot of combat, you would never

know that he was in. I remember him telling me he was in Tiara and the Water Canal, there was another bad one but I can't remember. He made it home and would tell me about his many adventures. He taught me about our Indian ways of life. You know he seen so much when he was in combat in his time. In order to cope, with all that he experienced in combat, he drank a lot.

When I was growing up, I didn't speak English. Back in the 40's and 50's those were some hard years, nobody had any money, back then it was commodities we lived on and hunted deer for meat. I remember in Lucky Mound we stayed right by the road there, we lived in a one room log house when I was about six or seven years old. We moved to a frame house. I always remember this log house; we had a little car to play with and my mother would get mad because I was making little roads on her floor it was a dirt floor. Back then, we had mostly canned food and I remember we had a root cellar so that's probably how we kept things

I will share what I remember where we lived and how we moved to where I live now. With some of my experiences I went through in my life time along the way.

In 1953 or 54 we moved to Mandaree. First, we lived in Red Butte, (which is Twin Buttes now)



West Segment Senior Living Twin Homes; The need for independent living for our growing elder population is of great importance to our community. We have a vision for an assisted living lifestyle, catering to just our senior members of our tribe. Twin homes that are single level, tastefully furnished and kept immaculately clean with manicured lawn service.

West Segment Community Center and Water Park:

We have a splendid vision for our community center. It will breath life and prosperity into our home town that boasts activities for all ages. An indoor water park attached to the community center will keep our families busy and healthy while providing the daily operations of our community center.

West Segment Youth Complex: The Youth Complex will be a combination of our outdoor sporting activities which include; baseball field, ice skating rink with warming house, skate park and restroom facility.

<u>West Segment Veterans Memorial Park:</u> Honoring all Veterans in our community with a memorial park and a comfortable place to sit and reflect.

West Segment Day Care: Our daycare will be located near the community building, but in a stand alone building. Taking advantage of all the benefits the center will offer our West Segment citizens.

Revision For White Oak Trailer Park: Our White Oak trailer park is in need of an upgrade due to excessive homes in the park. The families have limited space to park vehicles, and constrained space for outdoor activities. Also the utility lines are not buried deep enough causing broken pipes and electrical dangers.

Our solution is to reconfigure the lot sizes and to remove some of the home to relocate to a new area.

West Segment Land & Livestock slaughter House: West Segment has a strong ranching community. Most private businesses in West Segment are cattle operators. To expand on an already solid revenue stream, we are proposing to build our own slaughter facility. The manpower to run the facility already exists in our community and the product is ready too.

West Segment Administration Building: Our administration building will be a stand alone building to meet the needs of our growing community. Easily accessible and convenient for our community members.

West Segment Horse Track: The horse track will bring much needed revenue and create jobs that are fun, exciting, and benefit everyone. It will bring more outdoor events to our West Segment and establish an already thriving equestrian community. We look forward to hosting these events for all our tribal members.

West Segment Neighborhood Clinic: The neighborhood clinic we have today is a modular from the late 70s. The development of a new clinic is a priority for all our members.

So now you are all aware of what will be in progress here in our West Segment community which are all positive projects which will soon be in the works.

West Segment is also working towards these following goals; to improve the lives of the enrolled members and residents of West Segment. To carry out programs, services and other projects in the West Segment on behalf of and in collaboration with the tribes. To promote economic development in the West Segment on behalf of and in collaboration with the Tribes. To exercise delegated authority from the Tribes and the West Segment over the development, operation, promotion, and financing of Tribal businesses in the West Segment in order to further the economic, cultural, social and governmental development of the West Segment and; to develop, operate, and manage such businesses and investments as may be assigned to the Corporation by the West Segment Business Council Representative for the benefit of the West Segment or which may identified and pursued by the West Segment Development Authority with the approval of the West Segment Business Council Representative and the 5 member Development Authority Board: Arla Muzzy, Lisa DeVille, Cory Sanders, Franina Lincoln, other T/b/d. this will take place when approved by TBC.

I will inform you all in our next month's update and give you more information so you understand what's going on in our community.

Progress will happen it just takes some time for it to get going. I thank those who have been very supportive of my efforts, I appreciate it very much.







MHA Nation Represented At 45th Annual INFR

The Indian National Finals Rodeo is held every fall for the past forty-five years. Known as the World Championships to many Native American cowboys and cowgirls. INFR currently has eleven regions throughout the United States and Canada, sanctioning over eight hundred rodeos. The region represented by MHA contestants is the Northern Badlands Indian Rodeo Association (NBIRA). With several INFR sanctioned rodeos throughout the summer you will find a lot of Fort Berthold's pow wow Celebrations coincide with NBIRA tour rodeos as well. When talking with the first time Ir. Breakaway qualifier, Shannoah Danks she is the granddaughter of Paula and Clayton Danks. She is a sophomore at Killdeer High School, and member of the West Segment community, she said; "It was awesome competing with contestants from all over the United States and Canada. I've been to INFR many times supporting my other family members who qualified. It was a little more special this time for me." Although Shannoah missed her calf in the first and second rounds of the Jr. breakaway she says she plans to "keep practicing and working hard to get back to the World Championships in 2022 and hopefully be successful." In the rodeo area it is not common to see children compete with or against their parents. Megan Danks, a two-time INFR Ladies breakaway qualifier, who is the aunt of Shannoah, also made it to the short go round making the top sixteen in her event. "It's a lot of fun, its great to make it to the finals, shows your hard work has paid off" says Danks. Her and her horse Squirt who she "finished" herself, also carried the MHA Nation flag during the Parade of Nations during each session of the rodeo. On behalf of the Danks cowgirls, they wish to thank their parents and siblings for the support. "Thank you to all my supporters from my community who helped us get to the finals." says Megan. Another first time INFR qualifier, is Bailey Chase, granddaughter of Polly and Manuel Chase, who's a junior at Mandaree High School also qualified in the Jr. breakaway event. Visiting with her she said, "It was really exciting to go as a contestant in the Jr. breakaway, even though I don't show it, I was excited to be there competing." Bailey also came away with no time in both runs just missing her calf by inches. Breakaway roping is just one of the events Bailey competes in. She also does the barrel racing and team roping events, in which she plans to make her way back to the championships next fall where she will compete in the women's division. Jesse Chase, older brother to Bailey, took home the 2021 INFR Tour Champion Heeler, and his horse "Peyote Jack" was crowned Tour Horse of the Year to start out the Championship week in Las Vegas. "It's been a fun experience, it's always good to see friends and family down here in Vegas. It felt good to compete with some of best cowboys in Indian country and come back in 4th place out of 32 teams in the Team Roping event", says Chase of his wins

at the finals. Him and his team roping partner, Rope Three Irons of Lodge Grass, Montana went into the final round of the Championship sitting in 4th place in the Average, with 21.65 seconds after roping 3 steers, ultimately finishing 3rd for the round with a time of 4.64 seconds and 4th in the World Championships. He also qualified for the INFR in the tie down event finishing 15th respectively. Jesse's goal to get back to the Indian World Finals next fall is to "practice more and practice the right way, focus on the positive things more and help others to get to where I am." Jesse wishes to "First thank God for making everything possible and putting good friends and family in my life, also for giving me these abilities to do what I love. I'd like to thank my dad Chaundee for always being there for me and pushing me to be the best, taught me a really good life skill and that's to work hard and you get results. I'd like to thank my mom Verna and my grandmother Polly for always being there when no was there, they always show me kindness and would do anything for me and my children. A big shout out to Jerrilane Lincoln and the rest of her family, they were able to help me get down the road all year and in general are really nice people, thanks Jerri for all your support and help! Also, I would like to thank Jonas McGrady and the Three Affiliated tribes for helping me to get to the finals. To all my friends who had a helping hand when I needed, I'd like to say thank you. If I forgot to mention anyone it wasn't intentional, I have tons of people to be thankful for in this life and career."

Also another student from the Mandaree School who participated in the saddle bronc division was Tyrus Ashley, he is currently from Cherry Creek, South Dakota. He currently resides in our West Segment community. Our next MHA cowboy is Casey Stone, the son of Rosie Johnson and Jimmy Stone is no stranger to the INFR as he is a tentime Steer Wrestler qualifier who also qualified in the Tie down event this year. "It's a great atmosphere, good to be able to go back there. It was a great final after traveling hard, to all the tour rodeos throughout this year." says Casey. Stone who is already a two-time World Champion, in the steer wrestling event in 2010 and 2015 says; "I couldn't do what I do without the help and support of my family and community". Casey threw down two steers in the steer wrestling event finishing 23rd and finishing 11th in the Tie down roping event at the World finals. After a knee injury in 2020 Casey is ready to be back in the circuit, as he has plans to head to Detroit and Athens, Texas to focus on PRCA rodeos over the winter. Casey wishes to thank "Ivan and Lisa Johnson, Jimmy and Roseann Johnson, 4 Bears Casino, JC Johnson, MHA Nation, West Segment Community and all those who have helped me along the way."

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
Team Yeahquo Still Going Strong!



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

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Johnson's home that they moved from now. I remember I Lucky Mound across the ice to get to Mandaree, where it still sits today at his grade brother Ivan's place.

school. We were rushing to graduate from the eight grade back then, we had a big class. I always remember in the sports, there was hardly anybody that wanted to play us because we beat every team around us. From there we moved to Mandaree and we still live here today. When I was in the nineth grade, I went to school in Killdeer and that's where they sent everyone because of the flood. Back then there wasn't a school in Mandaree. I spent a year in Killdeer and from there went to Mandaree school my tenth grade and half of my junior year. I was missing a lot of school back then because our winter was so bad that I had to walk the girls to the bus stop and I would miss the bus. Then I had to walk the girls back to the house then I would run all the way to school so I wouldn't miss any school or I wouldn't be able to play basketball. I remember the bus driver was Albert Whitman; he would wait for me till he couldn't wait anymore so I would run to school and my face would be full of frost by the time I got to the school. I used to tell my kids, that I had to haul coal in the house, haul snow in the house put it in the reservoir, chop wood and go milk a couple of cows all before the bus came those were my chores. We didn't have electricity until years later.

Then I was sent to Stephan Catholic Indian School in South Dakota and that's where I graduated from. You know a lot of people talk bad about mission schools or boarding schools. On how mean they were and how they disciplined you. The nuns, sisters, priests disciplined us yet they taught us how to fix our beds, clean up after ourselves, a time to eat and a time to go to bed. So, for me, when I went into the service it wasn't bad at all because I knew that discipline really helped me.

From there the next year, I went to Haskell, I was there for about eight or nine months in business school. Then I switched and went

we lived right by to a trade school, a brick laying school and I ended up doing brick laying for twenty-two years. I stayed there during the summer and worked and I would come back home. From there I was traveling here and there following jobs that I had. After that, I joined the Army in 1961 I served until

1964 and I was on standby alert. Standby Alert is where they can call you in no matter where you're at. This was during the Viet Nam era. In 1972, I was stationed in Fort Carson, Colorado. Maybe some of you may remember this. It was October 1962, it was called the Cuban Missile Crisis. An American U-2 Spy plane secretly photographed nuclear missile sites being built by the Soviet Union on the island of Cuba. President Kennedy did not want the Soviet Union and Cuba to know that he had discovered the missiles. He met in secret with his advisors for several days to discuss the problem. We were on standby alert so we had to be ready when they came out of their meeting. When we were on standby, they brought us food. We were on standby for twelve days, we had our full packs ready to go and we weren't allowed to leave our barracks. If that war would of broke out, it was only seventy miles from Florida, that would have been bad if the Russians got that. This was all in 1962 and it was 1963 when President Kennedy got shot.

I always remember the old man, one time, I wanted to go to a movie so I asked the old man for a couple of dollars, and he said to me; you know son, you know what to do if you want money in your pocket. I was about twelve years old back then and you know what I've been working ever since. I laid brick for twentytwo years, I've been working for the Tribe since 1986 and today I am still working for the tribe. You know my dad he taught me his way too, but my dad's way was really different. Whereas my mom would say if you want to go to school, go to school that's good. So, as we all grew up, we actually brought that upon ourselves to go to school, because we knew we would learn. We all did that on our own. I know I spoiled my son when we had cattle it was just him and I that worked the cattle, we had four hundred head one time. The guys that really helped me and I still remember it today was Tommy Fox and Kenny Hale. Anytime I asked these guys for help they would be right there to help me. All those old timers are all gone now, I miss those guys being around.

Today I am an active member of Post 271 I was Commander for the past twenty-two years, then my

brother Bill Hale took over so he's been active now for quite a while. I this remember Post used called to be can't Badgun, I remember the first name. Well I remember Myron was killed in Viet Nam in 1971 and I think Dreke Irwin was our first Commander then my uncle Tony Mandan and I think we changed the name to Myron in 1977 or around that time and it's been that way since. Today it is known as Myron Johnson/Nathan

Goodiron Post 271. I am still active in this Post and we are constantly on the go, where ever they request flags up then our people rely on our Posts to be there to put flags up. For example; if a serviceman comes home on leave then we drop everything we're doing to be there to bring him in. We stand guard when we lose a Veteran, then at all the celebrations here on the reservation we are there bringing in the flags during their grand entries. We are there all the time and early in the mornings when they have their flag raisings we are there. So, we just drop everything of what we're doing and be there for the ones that requests Posts. So right now, there's a lot going on because of Veterans Day like in New Town they're having something for the Veterans so they're bringing in the flags in and I believe they will be doing the same thing this evening. Then for us, now we have a Veterans dance here in Mandaree so we will be bringing flags in for that too. I've been a part of Post for the past forty years, I started out as a legion member. Even if my brother Myron's name wasn't on Post 271, I would be still doing what I am doing today."

In our Indian ways of life, we have the highest honor for all our Veterans and our soldiers so when they come home on leave or when they finish their time in the service. We honor them, our families and relatives have a give a way in their honor because they have served their country and to this day, we have our freedom. Today we have those veterans who pick up eagle feathers at our celebrations when a dancer drops one, they give this honor to a veteran. According to Jimmy he states; "from what I was told this all began with our Chiefs; they were the ones who did things like this with our eagle feathers. It was a combat veteran that they would call upon to pick up that feather but if there weren't any combat veterans

then any veteran can pick up that feather." As visited about eagle feathers, I asked Jimmy what he did when someone approaches him and asks him to put an eagle feather on them or a plume. He replied; "I say my prayers for a couple of days before I do this for a person who asks me, I just don't go over there and put a eagle feather on them. Everyone is different, but that's the way I do things.

You know in our world today; everything has changed so much. We have a lot of drugs and this generation might be going down the wrong road, and it may take the next generation to change things and do away with drugs. A lot of things are different within the last six or seven years or so. It's good some of our older people get oil checks. It's their kids and grandkids who take advantage of that. Some grandparents can't say no so that's what's going on. They get money and want to help their kids out but what they do with that money, I don't know how you stop that; I know if I had to go out and move some cows, I wouldn't be able to find anybody to help me. No one around to help you nobody wants to help anymore. And that's how it is today and it's sad. I know a long time ago, when we were asked to help or do something we did it just like nothing. Today that's gone, no one wants to help you not unless you pay them for it. Now a days you have to have money all the time. I remember I and Tommy we sat in the saddle from morning till dark when we worked for Tone, he would tell us we had a big meal coming up and that meal would be wieners and beans every time and I don't remember any pay either. We used our own horses too and that's how things were back in the day when someone asked you for help. A lot of these pastures now are run by white people anyways it's good pastures too.

Covid-19 has hit a lot of people many of them have passed on due to this virus. I asked Jimmy what his thoughts were on Covid and how it has affected our people. As he goes onto share: "Well for one thing it has changed our ways of how we do our funerals and our wakes. I can see now with this younger generation that they would rather have their loved one viewed at the funeral home than taken to the cemetery from there. There was a few of them where I didn't see any donations or a senior pallbearer. Like I said everything is changing, all this information should come from their parents and down to their kids so they know how it used to be. So, the kids will have knowledge of what they're supposed to do. All this has to come from their upbringing too a lot of families don't have their grandparents, it's their parents that has to teach them but even then, our kids don't listen. You don't see a lot of parents involved with their kids anymore."

My family, there all doing good, my girls are educated enough now. I have sixteen grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren. I am my wife taught our kids to always be good to people. My kids know their Indian ways of life and how important that is. I and their mother always talk to them so they know.

You know I miss my old buddies, Tommy, Moosejaw, Dutch all those guys, I miss visiting with them. They're all gone now.

In closing, I asked Jimmy if he had anything else he'd like to share. He states; You know in my day; it was hard but everybody always listened to their parents and their grandparents back then. It's not like now things have changed so bad we are like the white man now everything is money, money. Long time ago, we were never like that, you know how we lived seemed like everyone was happy back then too. And you know we all went through drinking alcohol its nothing like it is today. When I was growing up, it was hard for me because my dad was a white man and I was a half breed. Even when I was working laying brick it was like I had to do better than the white man in my job, it was like I had to outdo him. When I went to school, and after school I was getting in fights, it was like I was an outcast, or pushed to the side. In the long run I had to put this out of my mind. My last name was Johnson so I caught it a lot because of that. I was mostly on my own all the time and did my own thing, I just kept on working and having a job so I had my own money in my pocket. I only asked my dad one time for money to go to the movie but I never asked him for money after that and that's when I was twelve years old. When I was young, I was shoveling grain for Oscar Berg in a little window in a big truck and a shovel. Then I used to round cattle up all day long and get one meal. Now a days anything you do you want money for it, its not about helping somebody out it's all about money. In closing he goes onto say; I'd like to thank you for asking me to do this interview. You know there's a lot of things I should of said but that's okay we will end this here.

I was very honored and thankful to visit, and share a cup of coffee with a very well respected veteran. I told Jimmy I was very grateful that he agreed to let me interview him, He didn't want to do this at first. He's not one to brag or boast about himself, he's quiet, generous, and a very kind hearted man. I told him I was happy he could share some of his adventures with his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Thank you from the bottom of my heart, Jimmy for sharing with everyone.

Academic Work and Quarantine Status

Submitted by Mrs. Bluestone, Supt. Mandaree School

When a student must quarantine for **COVID** exposure and is not ill, participating in distance learning opportunities is necessary to keep up with academics. If a student has a positive **COVID** diagnosis but still able to complete distance learning it is in their best interest to keep up with the assignments sent home. A student that is too ill to participate, he/she needs to concentrate on getting well and attendance will be made up when they are feeling better.

The school will do the following to ensure students have the opportunity to participate and recover attendance when quarantine period is over:

- 1. **PRINCIPAL:** Notify teachers of the student's quarantine status.
- 2. **PRINCIPAL:** Notify the teacher of the need to provide student work for the duration of the quarantine.
- 3. **TEACHERS:** The teacher(s) will bring student work to the front office. Assignments will be brought to


the office in an on-going manner as instruction in the class continues during the quarantine period.

- 4. **HALE/ABBEY:** Assignments will be delivered by Ms. Hale or Mr. Abbey.
- 5. **HALE/ABBEY**: Returned assignments will be picked up. The returned documents will remain in the

front office for 48 hours as a precautionary measure before being delivered to the teacher for grading.

6. **TEACHERS:** Teachers are to monitor assignments going home and assignments being returned.

- 7. **RECORDS CLERK:** An AQ attendance code will be used during quarantine period.
- 8. **PRINCIPAL:** When a student returns to school a conference will be held with the teacher to discuss whether the student returned all work sent home during quarantine with a passing grade. The student could also have participated in Google Meets during quarantine. Principal will determine if the student participated in academic work during quarantine. If the student successfully participated during the quarantine period, the attendance code will change from AQ to AR and no further attendance recovery will be needed. If the student does not successfully participate during quarantine the AQ will stand, and the student will need to attend attendance recovery opportunities (Saturday Academy, Power Tutoring, after school tutoring) to make up the attendance.

Student Athlete Eligibility and Attendance

It is important to remember that any day that a student is not physically present in school is a recorded absence. "Unexcused," "Excused," or "Medical Absences" or any other descriptors are all absent and treated the same. They all impact a student's average daily attendance rate. They must be made up. The District will align absent marks in the 2022-2023 school year and "Absent" will be the standard attendance mark.

The Student Handbook on pages 30-31 outlines eligibility requirements for student athletes. When the Attendance Policy (FFB) was updated in 4/28/2020, it focused on aligning student attendance requirements with Every Student Success Act (ESSA). ESSA requires that students maintain a 95% average daily attendance (ADA). This is challenging during the pandemic conditions that now exist but the District strives to ensure that students have the support needed to meet the requirement.

A student athlete can be deemed ineligible based on attendance even with passing grades. Bringing awareness to this requirement now ensures that students and families are not caught off guard when non-credit procedures are applied for excessive absences. A student will be non-credited when their absences exceed 4 days absence.

Attendance Plans:

A student that has already accumulated excessive absences has the opportunity to work with the administration and develop an Attendance Plan that will outline steps the student will take to recover absences. While the student is actively working to reduce the total number of absences, he/she will have a "waiver" for eligibility purposes. As long as the student is taking advantage of attendance recovery options, he/she will not be deemed ineligible for athletic events. If the student fails to follow through with the agreement, he/she will be ineligible until the absences are recovered

Additional Attendance Recovery Options:

Saturday Academy will now be held every Saturday! Many thanks to the teachers who are providing the supervision needed. We couldn't have attendance recovery options without teachers who are available to work beyond the "regular" school day. There is a sign-up sheet in the front office for students to attend Saturday Academy. There are 15 available "spots" for each grade band: Grades K-4, Grades 5-7, and Grades 8-12. There is no transportation available. A grab and go breakfast and lunch are provided. Hours are 9am-3pm. Students must be on time because the doors are not left open and are not attended to let in late arrivals. Students more than 5 minutes late may not make it inside so please do not just drop off a child. Please ensure that they make it inside the building.

Power Tutoring will be held on Monday and Thursday. This is determined by the classroom teacher. It will focus on groups of 2-3 students who need instruction on a specific skill set. The students will report to the gym right after school for a snack break and teachers will pick them up at 4:10pm. Tutoring will take place from 4:15pm-5:15pm and transportation will be provided at 5:15pm. You will be notified by your child's teacher if your child will be participating.

For students in grades 9-12 who have their own transportation additional tutoring is available on Tuesday and Wednesday with a cooperating teacher.

Student Drivers:

Students who drive to school must have the following in the front office: a copy of their driver's license, proof of insurance, and vehicle registration. Please see Student Handbook page 9 for guidance.

Parent Teacher Conferences November 18, 2021:

PTC's will be virtual again this time. Parents can call the school and schedule a time with Mrs. Danks.

Conferences will be held from 4pm to 8pm. In the interest of making time for all students, conferences will be held in 10-minute increments.

Grades 8-12 Report cards will be distributed to advisors/ teachers who will be able to provide general information on current grade status from 4pm-7pm.





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How to Drive in Hazardous Winter **Conditions**



Winter driving can create hazardous driving conditions. Both the vehicle and driver must be prepared for bad weather, road conditions and vehicle or equipment failure. The information is to help prepare both your car and yourself for hazardous winter conditions. Please take the time to review and make sure you and your occupants are safe on every trip.

General Information:

- Carry a cell phone
- Let someone know when you depart, your route, and expected arrival time.
- Dress according to weather conditions. Keep dry and wear clothing in layers.
- Do not leave without a full fuel tank.

Winter Car Care tips: AAA suggests every vehicle be inspected prior to winter weather. Start with these points;

- Have your exhaust, muffler and tailpipe inspected for cracks and visible defects. Carbon monoxide is a silent killer and can accumulate quickly in closed vehicles.
- Keep the gas tan at least half full to prevent frozen fuel lines and to allow you to drive an alternate route to safety or run your vehicle heater if you get stranded.
- Keep a bottle of lock de-icer in your purse or jacket to avoid costly delays during winter travel.
- Turn on the heater to ensure it's in proper working

order for the cold month ahead.

- Check your tires to see if they have at least 1/8 inch of tread and to make sure they are properly inflated.
- Inspect wiper blades for wear and tear, and make sure they are in good condition to clear the windshield of heavier precipitation associated with winter months. Keep windshield washer reservoir filled with antifreeze solvent.
- Clear snow and ice from your entire vehicle and keep it clear so that other drivers can see your hazard lights if you have to stop in an emergency. Remember to clean off headlights and taillights.
- Have your battery tested to ensure it is free of corrosion, has adequate water and is still strong enough to endure cold weather.
- Have brakes inspected by a professional mechanic to ensure they are in sound working order. Even braking on all four wheels will lessen the chance of skids on slippery roads.

Maintain a Vehicle Emergency Kit:

- Jumper cables
- Small shovel, some sand or cat litter for traction
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Flares or reflective triangles, something red or orange and a whistle to signal help.
- Cell phone
- Coffee can furnace (the candle generates heat) matches to light the candle.
- Carpet strips (for traction under drive wheels)
- **Boots**
- Ice scraper and brush
- Newspapers (great insulation when placed between skin and clothing)
- Tools, first aid kit
- Food and blanket
- Tire chains (for use on secondary roads only)

During a brief period in the 1980's, she was also the Acting Service Unit Director for the Indian Health Service Mini Tohe Clinic in New town, ND.

While back east, Helen's home was the center of all family activities hosting numerous Thanksgivings, Easter and Christmas dinners. She welcomed many Native professionals who were relocating to Washington, DC to her home while they started their new jobs and looked for housing in the area. Her door was always open and a good cup of coffee was always ready to be served. Helen retired in 1994 and moved home to Mandaree as she always planned during her long work career back east. In retirement, she was active on the Board of Directors for the Elders Organization for the MHA Nation. She also served on the Independence Congregational Church Board.

One of the joys of her life were her boys, Wesley and Philip. She enjoyed watching them play sports at the local ball parks and eventually seeing them both complete their college degrees at James Madison University for Wesley and Jacksonville State University for Philip respectively. She was a strong believer in higher education.

Helen could always be seen in retirement with her sisters Ethel, Linda and her brother in law Sonny at the local pow wows, bingos and of course at her favorite slot machines at the Four Bears Casino. Just prior to her passing, Helen shared, "her greatest joy in life was her family".


