COUNCILMAN SPOTTED BEAR'S GREETINGS


Tashka'nito'sha Aame,

(Greetings to all)

I hope everyone is having a wonderful holiday season. I would like to give my condolences to the families that have lost loved ones. They always say it is difficult when there is an empty seat at the dinner table during the holidays.

About the time I am writing this it is approaching Edwin Benson Day. I think back about all the wonderful visits we have had together. He was a very pleasant man and a quiet leader. Growing up I remember him and Annette in church always in their same seats up front. Edwin shared his knowledge with me as he was raised by his grandfather. Ben Benson did not learn the English language until he was seven years old. His first language was Mandan. He told me many stories of my grandfather Lorenzo "Larry" Spotted Bear who I never met. It was always a fun and pleasant experience visiting and spending time with Edwin and to this day I think of him often. I am thankful there is a special day set aside for our tribe in his memory and his honor. I would not have knowledge of the Mandan language without him.

It is nearly the Winter Solstice which



means the shortest daylight day of the year is almost here. The Mandan people believe the sun sits still in the south for four days and then starts its journey back to the north and our people look forward to the days getting longer. They also look forward to all the beauty and warm weather the spring season has to offer. We have so many things to look forward to.

We are a developing community in Twin Buttes. Our little segment is growing and expanding in housing, services and local opportunities. Our new clinic construction is going great, the building will soon be enclosed so the contractors can keep building throughout the cold winter months. The Twin Buttes fairgrounds project is well underway. All the infrastructure (water, sewer, electrical lines and earthwork) are installed, and the structures will now begin to be built. The area will include RV parking spots,

powwow arbor, outdoor rodeo arena, Indian relay horse race track, and an indoor arena. All our rodeo and powwow events will be conveniently located in one central location sitting on about 50 acres of land. The fairgrounds will be within walking distance to the youth of our community. The vision is to keep our youth involved with horses and productive activities that will enhance our children's growth and development, and keep our young people away from drugs and alcohol. The activities at the new fair grounds will stimulate the growth of our local economy, bringing in dollars and opportunities directly to Twin Buttes. It is a very exciting project and the project will move forward through the winter.




Twin Buttes Clinic

Greetings MHA Nation, I hope everyone is doing well. I would like to take time to reflect on this Nation's holiday.

Today, December 13, is recognized and has been declared for perpetuity among our tribal Nation as *Dr. Edwin Benson Day*. Dr. Edwin Benson is recognized and remembered among his people for his contributions to the perpetuation of the Mandan language and culture, outstanding citizenship, and exemplary moral character.

Dr. Edwin Benson was born to John and Alice (Bear Ghost) Benson. His mother passed when he was very young and he was raised by his grandfather Ben Benson "Buffalo Bulls Head." Edwin grew up in his grandfather's log cabin along the riverbottom in Elbowoods. He had fond memories of his childhood and the influence of his grandfather Ben. His grandfather called him "Inumaks," which means "The Man" in the Mandan language.

Edwin's first language was Mandan and he did not begin learning or speaking the English language until the age of seven. Edwin was also a fluent Hidatsa speaker. His grandfather Ben passed when Edwin was nine. Edwin became very independent at a young age and as a young man he rode the "Big Lease" tending cattle in the Mandaree area for a dollar a day.

In 1953 after the Garrison Dam was built Edwin relocated with other Mandan people to higher ground to what we now know today as Twin Buttes.

In 1955, Edwin joined in marriage Arlene (Reddoor) Benson and together they had 4

daughters. He continued to work as a cattleranch hand for ranchers in the area. Later in life Edwin was remarried to Annette (Birdbear) Benson and continued to live in rural Twin Buttes. He was employed at the Twin Buttes Road Shop for a time, and then moved on to employment with the Twin Buttes Elementary School where he was a custodian and a bus driver.

Years later he was called upon to be a Mandan language instructor for the Twin Buttes Elementary School as well as the Fort Berthold Community College. Edwin Became the last surviving fluent Mandan language speaker and was the consultant for a handful of linguists and other language specialists seeking to fulfill their master's thesis and doctoral dissertation studies.

For the Twin Buttes Community and Fort Berthold people Edwin was considered a cultural treasure. I often referred to him as the "Oracle." His knowledge of our language, culture, history, heritage, teachings, and sacred medicine of our tribe was extensive. He was the responsible caretaker of some of our oldest bundles including two of the ancient Mandan Turtle Drums.

He had an exceptional memory and I remember him closing his eyes and frequently recollecting fond memories of his childhood and what it was like growing up in his grandfather's log home. He shared many great stories with me of the old timers of Twin Buttes, and of my own grandfather Lorenzo "Larry" Spotted Bear who I never got to meet.

Recipe Swap



Low Carb Zuppa Toscana Soup

INGREDIENTS

Jimmy Dean Hot Sausage 4 slice thick cut bacon 32 oz. chicken broth 1 small diced onion 3 cloves fresh garlic, minced 2 bags of riced cauliflower ¹/₂ cup heavy whipping cream 2 cups fresh kale Salt and pepper optional Crush red pepper flakes, optional Shredded parmesan for garnish

Using a large soup pot brown sausage and bacon together. Cut your bacon into bite size pieces to make it easier to cook.

Once your meat is cooked, add in broth, onions, garlic, and cauliflower. Cover and cook on medium heat for about 15minutes, until the cauliflower is tender.

Once the cauliflower is softened, add in heavy cream and kale. Cook for about 5 minutes, until kale is soft.

Serve with a sprinkle of parmesan cheese and a pinch of salt, pepper, and/or red pepper flakes. ENJOY!






South Segment now has a horsemanship program open to community youth and families! Indigenous tribes have a strong and deep relationship with our relatives, the horses.

With the support of Councilman Spotted Bear and a SEDS grant from the DHHS Administration for Native Americans, we are excited to be able to promote community health through our horse culture. Weekly lessons are available for beginning to advanced riders, with a focus on relationship and communication with the horse.

In addition to horsemanship lessons, participants will be able to take in educational sessions on topics such as specialized disciplines (e.g. roping or barrel racing) and horse health, and showcase their skills at community events. Participants will also have the chance to visit the Equine Studies program at NHSC in New Town, which is the only one of it's kind in the country!

Limited winter sessions are available with some travel to a nearby heated indoor arena. However, in 2022, Twin Buttes will open a fully operational equestrian complex, including indoor and outdoor arenas, and a race track. We can't wait to see you there!

The Mac





Heaven gained an angel early November 30, 2021 when Mavis Marie Medicine Stone ("She Kills" - Mia waadi'heesh, Ishkoochid Daappiish), 71, of Bismarck, ND formerly of Twin Buttes, ND, a genuine member of the Low Cap clan and child of a Knife, journeyed to the spirit world at Augusta Place. Services will be held at 10:00 AM CST on Saturday, December 4, 2021 at Twin Buttes New Memorial Hall with Fr. Joseph Evinger officiating. Burial will follow at Medicine Stone II Cemetery, Twin Buttes.

A wake will begin at 5:00 PM CST on Friday, December 3, 2021 at the Twin Buttes New Memorial Hall, Twin Buttes. The family will be processing to the Memorial Hall from Barbot Funeral Home at 3:30 PM CST.

Mavis was born July 6, 1950 at Elbowwoods Hospital. Mavis grew up in the bottomlands until her family had to move up from Elbowwoods to rural Twin Buttes. Mavis loved the country and loved what it had to offer. Mavis went to elementary school in Twin Buttes and attended High school at Marty Indian Mission in Marty SD.

After high school Mavis and her sister moved to Bismarck where she worked as a daycare provider at UTTC. While in Bismarck she met her husband to be Dennis Howling Wolf Sr they were later on married on September 1973 and from this marriage they had two children Mary Ellen who was named after her grandma that she loved Mary Lone fight and her favorite uncle Allen Medicine Stone and Dennis Jr. The light of her life. Mavis was a very devoted mother she loved her children with all her heart. Mavis eventually moved back to Twin Buttes where she started working at Headstart as an assistant then eventually was the head teacher. Mavis was very dedicated into making sure that all her students understood the basics before going to the BIG school. My mom used to say you can memorize colors and ABC's but do you know the meaning of them. She always wanted to make sure all her students understood the meaning of things. My mom used to always say you have to LOVE being a teacher because it is a thankless job. But she loved teaching and all her students. Mavis eventually received her A.A from Fort Berthold Community College with a degree in Early childhood Education.

Mavis was also involved with the school board at Twin Buttes School and was also on the Board at Fort Berthold Community College. Mom was a dedicated worker and knew the meaning of hard work and getting an education.

Not only did Mavis work she also took care of her mumma and daddy. She loved her parents but her mom was also her best friend. The boys Calvin and Benny were also around the house to help out.

Mavis always made holidays, birthdays, and any special occasion extra special with her cooking and baking skills. Mom was such an amazing cook. She also made sure you never left hungry at any event especially during Twin Buttes powwow she always made sure you were fed.


When anyone needed help with anything like war bonnet dances or pow-wow committees' mom never hesitated to help when asked because that's how she was raised. "Never refuse" that is what she would say to her children.

Mom knew her ways when her dad, brothers, and son would catch their deer she never hesitated to butcher. She would just say bring it in and start butchering.

Mom loved to read and loved reading to her grandkids. You always got a book from mom for any special occasion.

Mom always had a smile for everyone and a kind word.

Mom loved her children but her grandchildren were extra special to her. That was especially when her grandson Justice Calvin came into





her life she raised him like her own since 2002. He was her side kick and they went everywhere together.

Mom was an angel on earth she dedicated her life to her family and cared for anyone that walked into her life.

We her family are honored to have had learned from an amazing woman that showed you what hard work meant and to never forget your ways or your people.


