The East Segment community of White Shield has been patiently awaiting the construction of its new facilities. Construction crews have been working diligently on all projects for the last two years. One of its final and biggest projects was officially completed this November. On Friday November 19th, the community came together to celebrate the grand opening of White Shield's new Ralph Wells, Jr. Community Center.

The event was held in their events room. East Segment Councilman Fred Fox hosted the event. Young Hawk Bear Post 253 rendered the flags at the start of the event. Guest speakers Chairman Mark Fox took the mic along with former Chairman Austin Gillette, Ed Lone Fight and Marcus Levings. A brief history was explained on the original Ralph Wells Memorial Complex along with the new Ralph Wells, Jr. Community Center name. The Ralph Wells name has been memorialized in the former complex for the last fifty years and will continue its legacy in the new community center. Woodstone Inc. and Brunton Architects and Engineers also got the opportunity to greet the community and give comments on the new community center.

The ribbon cutting ceremony took place at the entrance of the new building. Vida Wells McDonald (daughter of Ralph Wells, Jr.) cut the ribbon with Tribal Council members alongside her side. Tours were given throughout the facility. The Ralph Wells, Jr. Community Center has something for everyone to enjoy, no matter what age. Anyone may visit the new center during business hours. The facility holds a state-of-theart fitness center, a movie theater, a water park/swimming pool, an indoor track, basketball courts, and much more. It sits conveniently next to the new school, so kids may walk next door for extracurricular activities after school is out, or just to have fun. Children must be attended by an adult, however. The staff are all highly trained and professional in all areas of the community center.

"Black Pinto Horse" selected to represent the United States at the Dubai Art Expo 2021

Native Artist Monte Yellow Bird Sr.— Known to the Art World as "Black Pinto Horse"— was the only US artist to be selected to represent the United States and his Native People at the Dubai Art Expo 2021.

For immediate release — On November 5, 2021, the opening evening of an extraordinary three-day gathering of more than 500 artists from over 170 nations, Monte Yellow Bird Sr.—a member of the Mandan, Arikara and Hidatsa Nation—participated as the only artist from the United States selected to appear in the Dubai Art Expo. "This was a great, great honor for me, to represent both my country and my people," says the artist, who presents his work under his spiritual name "Black Pinto Horse."

Organized by curator Aurela Cuku, founder of the Artissima Art Agency in Dubai, the event dedicated itself to celebrating and encouraging the appreciation of global arts, culture, and heritage. "Ms. Cuku began collecting my work several years ago when I took part in a month-long artist residency in Abu Dhabi," says Yellow Bird. That city is

the capital of the United Arab Emirates, of which Dubai has become the trade, tourism, and cultural hub.

For the Dubai event, Yellow Bird decided to create a special artwork that spoke specifically to the spirit of peace and conservation shared by the native peoples of North America and the Arab world. Painted in his contemporary Native American/expressionist style inspired by the 19th-century ledger art created by Great Plains tribes displaced from their homelands, the 24-by-34inch oil-on-canvas piece entitled " The journey, A gathering of nations" features in its four quadrants an Arabian oryx, a white antelope species brought back from the edge of extinction through the efforts of His Highness General Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, Crown Prince of the Emirate of Abu Dhabi; the American bison, sacred to Native American peoples; an Indian lodge, with a warrior riding past on, most appropriately for the artist, a black pinto horse; and the Sheik Zayed Grand Mosque in Abu Dhabi, named for the founding father of the UAE, above which flies a golden falcon, national bird of that nation. "My goal in the painting," Yellow Bird explains, "was to express the emotional ties that exist between two distant peoples who share a dedication and honor to preserving their

environment."

At the grand opening reception in The Meydan Hotel, Monte Yellow Bird dressed in a tribal regalia—unveiled his painting for attending dignitaries and the press. He then shared a traditional tale of a meeting between a buffalo and a porcupine, and it's tragic end for the larger creature. "It's life lesson is about the importance of building relationships but also being careful about who you bring into your life," says the artist. Yellow Bird followed that story with a song he composed for Native flute in celebration of his journey.

Monte Yellow Bird's painting is now on display at Artissima Gallery in Dubai, awaiting one of his avid international collectors. Meanwhile, the artist has already been invited to take part in next year's big international Art Expo, slated to take place in Italy in November 2022.



MHA Drug Enforcement agent reflects on time in the Army, fighting drug epidemic on Fort Berthold

"My grandma would always say – and it's always been my motto – 'tomorrow's a new day, but you pray to get through today,'" said Dawn White, supervisory lead agent for the MHA Drug Enforcement Division.

White applies that to her work, but that saying dates back to how she grew up on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation, in White Shield.

Raised by her grandparents, White's professional timeline began right after she graduated high school.

"Every generation has had somebody going to the military," she said, "in every branch."

She wasted no time before she joined the Army. She said she always wanted to go.

She was stationed all over the U.S. and spent time abroad. She was sent to Bosnia for Operation Joint Endeavor.

White says her time in Bosnia and in the Army, overall, was stressful.

At just 19 years old, she left home. During her eight years as an Army medic, she says she found her warrior spirit.

"I wanted to show them that I am meant to be here, even if I am a woman, I'm meant to be here," she said.

Another place she's meant to be is on the front lines of the fight against drugs on Fort Berthold.

MHA Nation Chairman Mark Fox said, "The highest qualities that I speak of her is that A) she's homegrown and she's native."

"It helps me, I think more than it ever hindered me," White said, "to be a person on this reservation arresting our people. Because who wouldn't know their people than somebody who grew up here?"

"The second thing that I think that is really a strong attribute is that she's one of few women, active women, that are part of the force," Chairman Fox added. "And then the third one that I have to say is probably her strongest attribute, is that she's a veteran."

"I think sometimes that's all some people need, is just somebody to talk to," White reflected



about her experiences.

One of those people who needed someone like Dawn on their side is Telia Baker.

"I was a six-year heroin addict," Baker said. "Being one of the arresting officers with federal drug charges, she was there. It could've been anyone else sitting there, [but] Creator placed Dawn there."

After three years in prison, Baker returned home and expected to be judged. Instead, Dawn did the opposite.

She greeted her with a humble smile, Baker recalled.

Baker is close to eight years of sobriety and is the director at The Door resource and recovery center in New Town.

"It's always right in the back of my mind, Dawn's face," she said.

Agent White's job ranges from helping her people to tracking down large-scale drugtrafficking organizations.

"I tell a lot of people, you know, I can't help everybody, but I can help one person at a time."

She says she prays for the people she's up against. "I push everyone to go to treatment. I don't want them to be on the street, to live this life."

That's another thing she learned from her grandparents. They were direct, but kind, which is something she says she'd like to see more of.

Dawn White holds many titles, including Someone You Should Know.



WILBUR DALE WILKINSON, SR. OCTOBER 12, 1978 - OCTOBER 23, 2021

Wilbur Dale Wilkinson Sr., 73, of White Shield, North Dakota made his journey to "the place where life continues" on Saturday, October 23, 2021.

Wilbur Sr., is a member of the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara (MHA) Nation. His Indian Name is "Ciida buuxi adagish" Spotted Tail "Old One." He is a member of the Flint Knife Clan-Three Clan "Mate si-no-ga."

Wilbur Sr. was born in Minot, North Dakota, on October 12, 1948, to Ernest and Mollie Wolf Wilkinson. He was then adopted by Rose Crows Flies High after his mother's passing. He was primarily raised in White Shield, North Dakota, located on the Fort Berthold reservation. A descendant of Spotted Tail and Wolf Lies Down, he held the warrior spirit within himself. His fraternal grandfather was Mahlon Wilkinson, who served as the first Indian Agent at Fort Berthold. Upon receiving his diploma from White Shield High School in 1966, Wilbur Sr. received an undergraduate degree from Haskell Indian Junior College (known today as Haskell Indian Nations University). While at Haskell, Wilbur had his first taste of Indian advocacy by participating in the American Indian Movement (AIM) occupation of Wounded Knee. He later attended Northeastern University and the University of Oklahoma.

Intending to become an Indian Advocate, Wilbur Sr. began working for the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs in various capacities. During this time, Wilbur Sr. worked in Washington, D.C., North Dakota, South Dakota, and Arizona. While in Arizona, he met Eddie Basha Jr., the owner of Bashas', Inc., a grocery store chain in Arizona, and worked to launch the first Bashas' grocery store in Tuba City, Arizona, headquarters of the Western Navajo Agency.

After working for the federal government, he returned to Fort Berthold to serve his People. In November 1990, Wilbur Sr. was elected as the Chairman of the Three Affiliated Tribes. During his term, his most historic legal accomplishment was successfully lobbying for the passage of the Joint Tribal Advisory Committee (JTAC). Another significant victory as Chairman was building The Four Bears Casino & Lodge, which remains the most successful and long-standing project in MHA history. What is more, he negotiated the best gaming compact in state history for a Tribe. He also started the first Cattle Re-lending Program on the MHA Nation.

In Wilbur Sr's later years, he took on the USDA and represented 27 families, including his own, for discriminatory practices on Indian farmers and won an 18-year battle associated with the famed 2011 Keepseagle v. Vilsack settlement. He later established Spotted Tail & Associates, a professional service firm providing expert legal advice within the domains of tribal consultation, energy and natural resources, environmental issues, and litigation. Toward the end of his career, he focused his energies on providing allottee services for tribal members.

The culmination of his lived experiences, service as a tribal leader, and work as an untiring legal advocate have prompted many to view Wilbur Sr.'s passage as "A Good Man Walks Your Way."

Wilbur Sr. was a loving father, grandfather, brother, uncle, cousin and was a good relative to all. He is survived by His companion: Karen Rabbithead. Siblings: Alva Rose Hall, Charles Wilkinson, and Virgil Wilkinson (Judith). Children: Charlotte (Ryan) Davidson, Norma (Raymond) Naito, Sallie Wilkinson (Ronnie Mizner), Ernest O. Wilkinson III and Wilbur D. Wilkinson, Jr. Grandchildren: William Wilkinson, Matthew Davidson and Winona Mizner. Stepchildren: Coby Rabbithead and Michael Stevens. Stepgrandchild: Deyondre T. Simpson.

He was preceded in death by his Parents: Ernest and Mollie Wilkinson. Paternal Grandparents: Ernest Wilkinson Sr. and Margaret Beauchamp. Maternal Grandparents: Daniel Wolf and Lillie Eaton. Brother: Harry Wilkinson. Sister: Virginia Wilkinson.

A viewing will be held Thursday, October 28 from 5 to 9 p.m. at the Thompson Funeral Home at 48 3rd Street NE, Garrison, North Dakota 58540.

Funeral services will be held Friday, October 29th at 10 a.m. at the Thompson Funeral Home. Following the graveside service at Immaculate Conception Catholic Cemetery, the family will provide a boxed lunch served at the White Shield Community Center at 1620 61st Avenue, Roseglen, ND 58775.




WHITNEY KENDRA HOSIE OCTOBER 1, 1988 - NOVEMBER 7, 2021
