

Forgiveness



What is forgiveness? Psychologists generally define forgiveness as a conscious deliberate decision to release feelings of resentment or vengeance toward a person or group who has harmed you regardless of whether they actually deserve your forgiveness.

Forgiveness is the pathway to peace for a person or group. The decision to forgive is a personal decision that

has to take place inside the person. It is very helpful to ask in prayer for the grace from God to forgive. Holding unforgiveness in my heart has me feeling angry, mad, bitter, betrayed, resentful, disrespected, ridiculed, indignant and so on.

These feelings are dangerous to hold on too. They have led me to the point of hopelessness, despair, helpless and powerlessness. I used to try to numb these feelings. I did not know I was holding on to resentments. Having resentments unchecked can become mixed and interwoven. I found relief when I surrendered, because I became tired of fighting the same thing or the same person who was never going to change anyway. Most of these resentments occurred in the past and I cannot change or undo any of my past hurts or wrongs done to me or by me.

With resentments, the more I try to just forget them, the more they come up and it also seems like I am quicker to justify them at any means. One of my Spiritual Directors told me that having a resentment or being resentful or holding on to hate is like drinking poison and expecting the other person to die.

My Spiritual Director went on to explain that I will not know peace until I forgive. This meant for me to quit fighting. He also said that forgiving people doesn't make you one of them. He said it releases you from the things that block you from the sunlight of the spirit of God. Being able to do this takes courage and a willingness to be able to look at yourself. It's kind of like driving a car, we can't just get in and go and never look at the fuel tank level or oil etc. We have to take an honest inventory of ourselves, otherwise just like the vehicle that doesn't get any fuel, it will not move.

We can always turn to God and ask for guidance. Many of our past hurts run deep, and some are even hidden. Evil loves it when we hold on to them. Evil would love to see us drown in hate for each other.

Like I said, it takes courage. But when I have made that decision to turn it over to God and made that decision to forgive, it does not mean I forget, but I do feel relief in those areas of my life.

God the Creator made us in his image. The son, Jesus, came to help us, to redeem us for our past sins. He came to give us a pathway forward to the Father. They sent the Holy Spirit to guide us.

May Almighty God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit bless you all the days of your life. Amen!



Letters to the Editor

My name is Lisa DeVille, I am a citizen of the Three Affiliated Tribes, and a resident of Mandaree, ND which is in the heart of the Bakken Play. My family and I experience the negative impacts of living in a community that has an enormous amount of oil and gas extraction and associated activities. Not only are we immediately harmed by poor health and a damaged environment, but we are also impacted by the effects of climate change, including severe weather, drought, and fires.

As you know, Methane is an eighty-six times more powerful greenhouse gas than carbon dioxide. The oil and gas industry's methane and other air pollution are fueling the climate crisis and threatening the health and safety of my (and others') communities.

Routine flaring is a major source of methane and other pollutants and must be eliminated. Colorado and New Mexico have already done this at the state level and EPA should end this dangerous and wasteful practice. North Dakota has a flaring intensity of 7% - 7 times greater than that of the next highest state which is New Mexico at 1%. Please, help North Dakota reduce our flaring intensity. We know it can be done and as our state government is unwilling to do this, you must step in.

All wells, regardless of their Potential to Emit should have monthly Leak Detection and Repair inspections. My community is directly and immediately impacted by the toxic pollutants that are emitted alongside methane and we are also facing the terrible consequences of these greenhouse gases being emitted by the effects of global warming.

In addition to eliminating routine flaring, the EPA should require more, regular monitoring at oil and gas facilities, increase the number of ambient air monitoring equipment and place them in locations that give people real data on the air that they are breathing, assist tribal communities who want to see their tribal government create a Tribal Air Monitoring System, and include community or third-party air monitoring, including drone sampling, into its regulations.

Uphold your responsibility to protect all people and remember the Trust responsibility the federal government has to tribal citizens.

In closing please:

1. Finalize the initially proposed rule as soon as possible.

- 2. Issue a supplemental rule to:
 - 1. End the wasteful and dangerous practice of routine flaring at oil and gas facilities.
 - 2. Require monthly Leak Detection and Repair of all wells regardless of their Potential to Emit.
 - 3. Install more monitors, assist and support government and community groups in developing air monitoring programs, and incorporate emission monitoring results generated by community groups and other third parties into its standards.

US Senate approved NEPA Phase 1 Rulemaking Congressional Review Act (CRA)

Recently the US Senate approved a Congressional Review Act (CRA) regarding the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Phase 1 rulemaking. This CRA sponsored by Senators Hoeven and Cramer would, if passed by the US Congress, present serious threat to the federal environmental review process and efforts to tackle climate change and environmental injustice through NEPA.

As a citizen of the MHA nation, I know that NEPA is often the only opportunity tribal citizens get to learn about and make a public comment on a proposed federal project on tribal lands. This is an environmental justice issue as well as a climate change issue. My people are already suffering poor physical and environmental health due to all the extraction going on around us, we need to be able to weigh in on future federal projects so that we can protect ourselves, our environment, and future generations. Then, because of climate related issues such as fires, drought, severe storms we are impacted again.

The Fourth National Climate Assessment (NCA4) in chapter 12 concluded: "Climate change increasingly threatens Indigenous communities' livelihoods, economies, health, and cultural identities by disrupting interconnected social, physical, and ecological systems."

I am disappointed that my Senators choose to ignore the needs of me, my family, and my people by sponsoring this terrible legislation. I hope that it will die in The House.

This CRA is a terrible piece of legislation. NEPA is critical to getting projects reviewed for impacts to land and people, particularly on tribal lands. NEPA language needs to be strengthened not hamstrung!

2022 ABSENTEE APPLICATIONS

RESIDENT VOTERS WHO MAY USE PROCEDURE

A Qualified voter, who is an enrolled member of the Three Affiliated Tribes and a legal resident of the Fort Berthold Reservation on date of an election, whether a Primary or General Election, may register to vote and cast his/her ballot in accordance with the procedures prescribed in this chapter, only if one of the following conditions is satisfied:

- He/she will be absent from the Reservation on the date on which the election is to be held and will be unable to be present at any segment polling place during the designated poll hours for only the following acceptable conditions:
- a) Absence due to duty schedule work related travel;
- b) Hospitalization;
- c) Attending school where he/she is unable to travel to the reservation of the day of election;
- d) Extreme physical disability where traveling is physically impossible;
- e) Service in the United States Armed Forces and spouses (Proof shall be required for all above)


Linda Baker, Awa-XXidi Mea (Light Woman); was born August 8, 1942 at home near Elbowoods on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation. She attended grade school and high school at boarding schools, since the policy of the federal government at that time was to get Indians off the reservation and integrate them into white society. While that was the apparent goal, the legacy of this period of colonialism was a fracturing of tribal relations to this day we are still dealing with. When speaking of her boarding school servitude, Linda was never proud. In fact, it was part of what drove her to eventually go to college so she could teach Indian kids on the reservation, rather than away from their families. She graduated from Flandreau Indian School in 1960, then had a period of time where she worked in clerical roles for the Indian health service and the three affiliated tribes. When she was an Indian health service employee, she lived in Rockville, Maryland where her two sisters lived, they also worked for the Indian health service. In 1980, she decided that she wasn't really going to get anywhere in life unless she got herself an education. She attended college at Dickinson State College in Dickinson, ND, with a major in English and a minor in German. She would talk of someday going to Germany, but she never actually got to make that trip. She graduated in 1984, after having done her student teaching in the spring semester of 84 at Dickinson's Trinity high school. Teaching English would become her passion for the next 30 years. Her students were always very important to her, and their success and learning was the driving force behind her instruction. It always caused her no end of grief when one of her students passed away. To the extent that she was able to, she attended all of their services until her later years of life when she said it was just too difficult to continue to attend those services. She loved all her students, even the bad seeds (they know who they are), and she was always happy and proud of them. She always enjoyed her family, including all of her siblings. She was very close to her brother Lyle, they were two years apart. She had two sisters still living in Maryland so naturally she spent most of her time with her two brothers and their families here on Fort Berthold. Since she was the youngest in the family, they referred to her as "baby", and they called her that for the rest of their lives. When she finished college, she lived in Mandaree for several years until her parents needed help on the ranch, particularly her father. While she wasn't a conventional ranch hand, she never backed away from it. During the week she would cut hay with the swather, her brothers would come and bale it on the weekends. She was also accomplished fixing fence, and she earned her PhD (post hold digger) at a young age. Linda and her brothers helped on the ranch for many years, until her brother Lyle passed away in 1990, and her father passed away just a few years later. Her brother Milton passed away in 1998. At that point it was just Linda and her mother living on the ranch, they kept the ranch because she could not part with them after Philip passed away. These cattle would stay on the ranch until her mother passed away in 2002. Linda and her brothers would joke all the time about how difficult it was to be ranchers and cowboys. This was especially true when they fed cattle in the winter. One of the things that always vexed her about being a rancher was when other ranchers could not fix fence and take care of their animals. These animals then would invariably end up on her ranch, and she would have to find out who they belonged to or she would have to drive them out. Just a few days before her death, she was a passenger in a pickup moving at high speed across the prairie, chasing six horses. While the people in the backseat were justifiably terrified, she enjoyed herself and was even laughing. She once had her picture taken while she was cutting hay, by a mashii-mia photographer from some university in Canada. This picture is hanging on the wall at this university in Canada because it was emblematic of the kind of work Indian women never shied away from. While she was a rancher, she was also named English teacher of the year for the state of North Dakota, and she collaborated with the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commissioner, Cheryl Kulas to write a curriculum. She was proud of this, but she would not brag about it. She continued with education throughout her life, eventually earning enough credits for a master's degree in education. While she was then qualified to be an administer, she had no desire to do so, holding most administrators in a particular sort of disdain. For her, it was all about the students. In her later years, she was heard to describe her job as the best kind of job anyone could have.

When it was pointed out that she was retired, she would then describe her "job". She would describe a day with her cat Diego, her trips to the casino, then having supper with her cat when they would read together or watch TV or play. When she was told that wasn't really a job, then she would say that was why it was the best job anyone could have. She enjoyed going to pow wows, traveling to Las Vegas (or other destinations), and spending time with her family members.

One event in her life that she was most proud of was when she was able to see her father inducted into the North Dakota Cowboy Hall of Fame, modern era ranching division.

Linda is survived by her sister Ethel (Sonny), her son Biron (Sheri) and her daughter Trena (Al). She is also survived by four grandchildren; Nickolas, Jordan, Arlin, and Skylar and three great grandchildren Ezla, Sansa, and Hendrick.
