From the desk of Fred Fox, Councilman, East Segment, White Shield, ND 58540

Hello, Elders and Community Members,

I would like to send my condolences and prayers to all the family members that have lost loved ones. It's been a tough summer with the loss of our relatives.

Reflecting on this past weekend, there were many activities starting on Thursday with the golf tournament. It was the 1st Annual Arikara Golf Scramble which was held at the Garrison Country Club. There were 40 teams that participated, which turned out to be a very successful event.

Friday was the start of the 1st Annual White Shield Stampede. It was an Indian National Finals Tour Rodeo. The rodeo had the privilege of being the first one to use the brand new rodeo grounds. It was a White Shield Segment funded project and it is still an on-going, working project. The current facility cost \$200,000, and it will be a valuable asset to the community for years to come. We are currently planning to have the GPIRA Finals this fall. This is a good sign letting us know our facility is a first-class arena. Not only will we have rodeo events but we can start horsemanship classes for our youth so they can be a part of what has been lost in our community.

The Pow-wow turned out to be the biggest celebration White Shield has ever seen. We had over 500 dancers and 27 drum groups from across the United States and Canada. The top prizes were 2 Hyundai Sonatas worth \$25,000 to the top adult man and woman dancer. The dancers competed in 32 different dance categories and three different drum categories.

With all the activities going, there was also the 2nd annual softball tournament and horse races that turned out to be very successful events which turned a lot of horse-back riders and softball teams.

This past month the Tribal Council had a meeting with Doug Burgum, ND State Governor concerning River Bed minerals, Oil and Gas Taxes, and Gaming Compacts. We thought they were successful initial talks with the State Governor. We had disagreements with everything except the Gaming Compact developed 25 years ago. It is still in tact, and we will be making some modifications to the Compact. We will continue to fight for our ownership of the River Bed and to get all the share of the oil and gas tax revenue.

This coming month will start the beginning of the school season and the completion of the new school. Everyone is excited to move into the new facility and start using the first class gymnasium and other new amenities the school will bring. We will continue to work on improvements such as landscape and surrounding area outside of the school.

In closing, we are organizing the Arikara and Pawnee Reunion which will be held in Norfolk, Nebraska, September 28 through October 1. We will have more details in August.

Have a great rest of the summer and enjoy the state fair, we also distributed all the mega bands to the summer youth workers and students of the White Shield school. Take care and God Bless.

A Copy of the Notice of Candidacy can be obtained from Secretary Fox's Office. The Secretary will begin receiving Applications for Candidacy on **Wednesday**, **July 25**, **2018**. In order to be eligible to become a candidate for any of the above offices you must file a Notice of Candidacy together with a non-refundable filing fee of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) with the Secretary of the Tribal Business Council by no later than 4:30 p.m. on **Thursday**, **August 9**, **2018**.

Qualifications for candidacy to the Tribal Business Council are as set forth in the Tribal Constitution and Election Ordinance, which, can be obtained from the Secretary's Office. In order to be eligible to vote in the Primary Election you must be enrolled and 18 years of age or older on September 18, 2018. In order to be eligible to vote in the general elections you must be enrolled and 18 years of age or older on November 6, 2018.

They are known world-wide and have played to national television audiences like the Tonight's Show and the Bill Board Awards. Recently her grandson was a guest on the national television program called "Little Big Shots."

Gillette (left) stands with Jonathan Riley, who is the great-grandson of Pricilla Dickens. Pricilla, who is 103 years old, is the oldest Arikara woman in the tribe. She lives with her daughter ReeMairena in California.

He gave Riley the name Grateful Coyote.

Gillette, 71, has given names to many people in the community. He also conducts ceremonies for the Sacred Bundle he has taken care of for 31 years. He is also asked to participate in many ceremonies in the community because of his knowledge of the culture.

He is a Vietnam Veteran.





First Rodeo (Stampede) turns into a winner for White Shield. The riders who roped, rode broncs, bulls and wrestled calves did it well. The first Relay turned out fun, wild, scary and a winner for all participants and watchers.

The idea for a rodeo arena and race track was something that many people doubted could be done certainly not in the time frame they set for themselves. Yet there on the virgin prairie rose the fences, gates, shuttes and announcer shack. A gate post announced this would be the Ree Ranch with the arena the gateway.

Frank White Calfe, former councilman for White Shield and now a rancher/farmer, set about planning the White Shield Stampede. White Calfe is a hands-on manager. He rarely missed days out in the area while the arena was taking shape. When he talked to the News Journal staff, he was confident that this would be a first yet turn out to be a first best.

Fred Fox, the current councilman for White Shield, said what they would call this endeavor is the Ree Ranch and it would start with the Rodeo Arena and raceway. Then he said they are working toward raising cattle, chickens, pigs and having gardens. It will be a ranch that can feed the community with beef, pork, chickens, and vegetables. It can be a teaching tool for young people who can learn the skills of animal husbandry, including chickens or turkeys. Learning about growing and canning vegetables and fruits can also be included.

The community is being assaulted by alcohol and drugs. It is the hope of Fox that teaching these skills and having young people experience a kind of life will help them turn toward a better way than then alcohol and drugs.



Edmund or "Ed" as he was known, a member of the Three Affiliated Tribes, was born on June 25, 1949 to Benedict and Ramona (Baker) Heart at Minot. His grandfather, Frank Heart, gave him his Arikara name "NUstakuuneeRA" (Good Day). Edmund passed away on July 8, 2018 at Sanford Hospital in Fargo. Edmund was a member of the Dripping Dirt (Awaxé) Clan. He recently made his home in Bismarck.

Ed grew up in the Buffalo Rock area and as a young boy he attended schools in White Shield, ND and Wakpala and Pierre, SD. He earned his GED from Job Corps in Bismarck and then went on to earn his auto mechanic certification from United Tribes Technical College (UTTC) in Bismarck.

He then moved to Nespelem, Washington, where he owned and operated his own mechanic garage for several years and then returned home to be with family and friends. Ed was once employed at Parshall Resource Center (PRC), assisting with whatever needed to be done to run as smoothly as possible. During this time, he saw their need for a reliable vehicle. Along with his siblings, they purchased PRC a brand-new vehicle to take clients for medical appointments, meetings, or just to get away for a day outing to the movies or shopping. He was also employed at Rockview Nursing Home in Parshall where he became a certified nursing assistant (CNA).
