NDSU Hosts 3 Day Workshop On Succession Planning For Farm & Ranch

Dosha! My name is Alyssa Baker. I was appointed by West Segment Councilwoman Gladys Sherry Turner-Lone Fight as the Financial Manager for the MHA Land & Livestock Corp back in November. The Director of this department is Ted Lone Fight III and he offered me an opportunity to attend the 2021 NDSU Extension Service Succession workshop for ranch and farming families. This workshop was hosted by the NDSU Extension Services and The McKenzie County Office located in Watford City, North Dakota.

My main reason for attending this workshop was to learn more about the farm and ranching industry and to be more qualified for my position. Succession planning is the continuous process that involves the following; transferring knowledge, skills, labor, management, control and ownership between generations. A succession plan can provide the following; financial security, opportunity, clarity, vision and focus. For myself, I was the youngest attendee out of the twelve participants. I had the opportunity to witness how other family businesses have similar struggles as far as not having a plan for their business. Problems such as; taxes, failure to transfer management authority.

In this workshop we discussed the planning process (communication) also considering the long term business plan, then learning the succession language. We reviewed business planning for each individual operation. In that reviewal we went over the following; future goals, what to produce, how to market, how to finance, how to own property and equipment and how to manage risk. With this knowledge, I hope to implement everything that is beneficial to our MHA Land & Livestock department.

Here is a quick little update on things happening at the Mandaree Elders' Meal Site

For the month of February we had a Valentines Day turkey dinner! We are now searching for something creative for this Month.

April is bringing in Easter and we will be having a special delivery with the meal! Know that we are striving to have our menu published in the West Segment newspaper.

With the extreme cold temperatures last month we ask that you bear with our delivery staff and us. Our building had issues that were beyond our control. We are asking if you can give us your phone

numbers so we can call you individually when we will not be delivering. Reminder, if you have animals, please keep them indoors or in a safe place so our staff can make the delivery to your door without dealing with animals who are unfriendly to non-family members.

Meals are served from 11am-12:30pm, Monday through Friday and breakfast is from 8am to 9am. Meal deliveries leave the building between 10:30 am to 10:45 am Monday to Thursday. Friday meals deliveries leave the building between 8:00-8:15am.

Eligible persons to receive meals are those 55 and over and are members of a federally recognized tribe. Those under 55 who request a meal are required to pay \$5.00.

The Mandaree Elders Meal site would like to ask each of you that if you are not going to be home please call and let us know. Our phone number is 759-3092, if we do not answer the phone please leave a message on the answering machine as at times we are busy and are unable to answer the phone.

Quick reminder, if you have an appointment all elders are asked to contact Rosie Johnson at 421-8519 or 759-3377. You are asked to bring in your documents to Rosie Johnson at least 2 to 5 days ahead of your doctor's appointment, which will give her enough time to take care of everything.

The elders building is not yet open for congregate meals we are still closed to the public. We have been taking every precaution to stay healthy and safe through this pandemic.

Ribbon skirts and dresses were always worn on a daily basis by Mandan and Hidatsa women many years ago. Now today it's a trend among women who wear their ribbon skirts to work, some wear them only to ceremonies and honoring's. An opportunity was offered to anyone who wanted to learn how to make ribbon skirts. Their first class saw twelve participants who enjoyed learning how to sew ribbon skirts. When they got close to finishing their skirts, they ended up with only seven participants who completed the full class for making these skirts.

Roni Stiffarm, the Cultural Coordinator says, "We want to keep our cultural traditions alive, we wanted to teach the kids the cultural values as we did our sewing projects."

These young girls all did an outstanding job in completing their ribbon skirts. They were coached on how to make them, as each participant finished their own skirts. As you can see in the photo below, the girl's put on their beautiful ribbon skirts to show everyone what they can do.

Reflections on Jesus' Passion and Death



For many years I have desired to write a set of reflections for the Catholic tradition we call Stations of the Cross, but it was not until COVID-19 forced us to broadcast our services online and avoid violating copyright laws that I felt inspired to try again. The stations consist of fourteen reflections on the Passion and Death of Jesus. Woven within these reflections is a theme to surrender oneself to Jesus. This article cannot

include all fourteen reflections, but I have included four. As you read them and reflect upon your own life, it is my hope that you will turn more of your life over to Jesus and let him guide you to Eternal Life.

Jesus carries His cross: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you. Because by your Holy Cross, you have redeemed the world. How can Jesus carry the cross? It is not light. In fact, I am sure it is quite painful and awkward. Just the slightest movement brings pain from open wounds and thorns that pierce his head. Jesus, my Lord, how is your surrender to the Father's plan the strength that enables you to endure such pain? I find that I shy away from just the slightest discomfort. I know you want me to have this strength to surrender to your plan. I also know you want me to ask. So, I humbly beg you, please Lord, give me your strength and the desire to surrender to your plan.

Jesus is stripped of his garments: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you. Because by your Holy Cross, you have redeemed the world. You made it to Calvary! And now you surrender your clothes. How embarrassing! Everyone can see. With no clothes, your wounds are exposed. Laughing soldiers divide your garments among them by rolling dice. How demoralizing! I do not like to be embarrassed or laughed at. Nor do I like others to see my wounds. I shrivel up and hide. O Jesus, the depth of your love for your Father gives you such confidence and trust. You know that he will not laugh at you. Nor will he humiliate you. Please give me this deep love so that when I stand before you naked and with my wounds exposed, I will not fear you.

Jesus dies on the cross: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you. Because by your Holy Cross, you have redeemed the world. Every breath is painful. Yet you speak. "Father, forgive them." Seconds become minutes! Minutes become hours! You breathe your last. You surrender your spirit. The earth quakes. "It is finished." My Lord and my God, you even surrender your soul. All part of your Father's plan! I too, one day must breathe my last. I too must surrender my soul. Jesus, give me the grace to have complete confidence that when that day comes, I know I will not be alone. Just as the Father was there

for you, so you will be there for me. **Jesus is laid in the tomb:** We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you. Because by your Holy Cross, you have redeemed the world. The Sabaoth Day is fast approaching. Clean linen respectfully covers your body. Gently laid in a rock-hewn tomb your body rests. Cold stones seals the entrance. Now they wait. Lord Jesus, you have given everything. Nothing of yours remains. Your tomb belongs to someone else. They bury you in haste. They have more to do on the third day. I cannot even begin to comprehend the depth of your abandonment to your Father's plan. Astounding! Please Lord Jesus, give me the grace to completely surrender everything till nothing remains. You have given me life and you will give me death. Please, Lord Jesus, may my life and death glorify your name forever.

DrugFacts

What is Fentanyl:

Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid that is similar to morphine but is 50 to 100 times more potent. It is a prescription drug that is also made and used illegally. Like morphine, it is a medicine that is typically used to treat patients with severe pain, especially after surgery. It is also sometimes used to treat patients with chronic pain who are physically tolerant to other opioids. Tolerance occurs when you need a higher and/or more frequent amount of a drug to get the desired effects.

In its prescription form, fentanyl is known by such names as; Actiq, Duragesic, and Sublimaze. Street names for illegally used fentanyl include; Apache, China Girl, China White, Dance Fever, Friend, Goodfellas, Jackpot, Murder 8 and Tango & Cash.

Synthetic opioids including fentanyl, are not the most common drugs involved in overdose deaths in the United States. In 2017, 59.8% of opioid related deaths involved fentanyl compared to 14.3% in 2010.

What are Opioids?

Opioids are a class of drugs naturally found in the opium poppy plant. Some opioids are made from the plant directly, and others, like fentanyl, are made by scientists in labs using the same chemical structure (semi-synthetic or synthetic).

How do people use fentanyl?

When prescribed by a doctor, fentanyl can be given as a shot, a patch that is put on a person's skin, or as lozenges that are sucked like cough drops. The illegally used fentanyl most often associated with recent overdoses is made in labs. This synthetic fentanyl is sold illegally as a powder, dropped onto blotter paper, put in eye droppers and nasal sprays, or made into pills that look like other prescription opioids. Some drug dealers are mixing fentanyl with other drugs, such as heroin, cocaine, methamphetamine, and MDMA. This is because it takes very little to produce a high with fentanyl making it a cheaper option. This is especially risky when people taking drugs don't realize they might contain fentanyl as a cheap but dangerous additive. They might be taking stronger opioids than their bodies are used to and can be more likely to overdose. How does fentanyl affect the brain?

Like heroin, morphine and other opioid drugs, fentanyl works by binding to the body's opioid receptors, which are found in areas of the brain that control pain and emotions. After taking opioids many, the brain adapts to the drug, diminishing its sensitivity making it hard to feel pleasure from anything besides the drug. When people become addicted, drug seeking and drug use take over their lives.

Fentanyl's effects include:

- extreme happiness
- drowsiness
- nausea
- confusion
- constipation
- sedation
- problems breathing
- unconsciousness

Can you overdose on fentanyl?

Yes, a person can overdose on fentanyl. An overdose occurs when a drug produces serious adverse effects and life threatening symptoms. When people overdose on fentanyl, their breathing can stop. This can decrease the amount of oxygen that reaches the brain, a condition called hypoxia. Hypoxia can lead to a coma and permanent brain damage and even death.

How can fentanyl overdose be treated?

As mentioned, many drug dealers mix the cheaper fentanyl with other drugs like heroin, cocaine, MDMA and methamphetamine to increase their profits, making it often difficult to know which drug is causing the overdose. Naloxone is a medicine that can treat a fentanyl overdose when given right away. It works by rapidly binding to opioid receptors and blocking the effects of opioid drugs. But fentanyl is stronger than other opioid drugs like morphine and might require multiple doses of naloxone. Because of this, if you suspect someone has overdosed, the most important step to take is to call 911 so he/she can receive immediate medical attention. Once medical personnel arrive, they will administer naloxone if they suspect an opioid drug is involved.

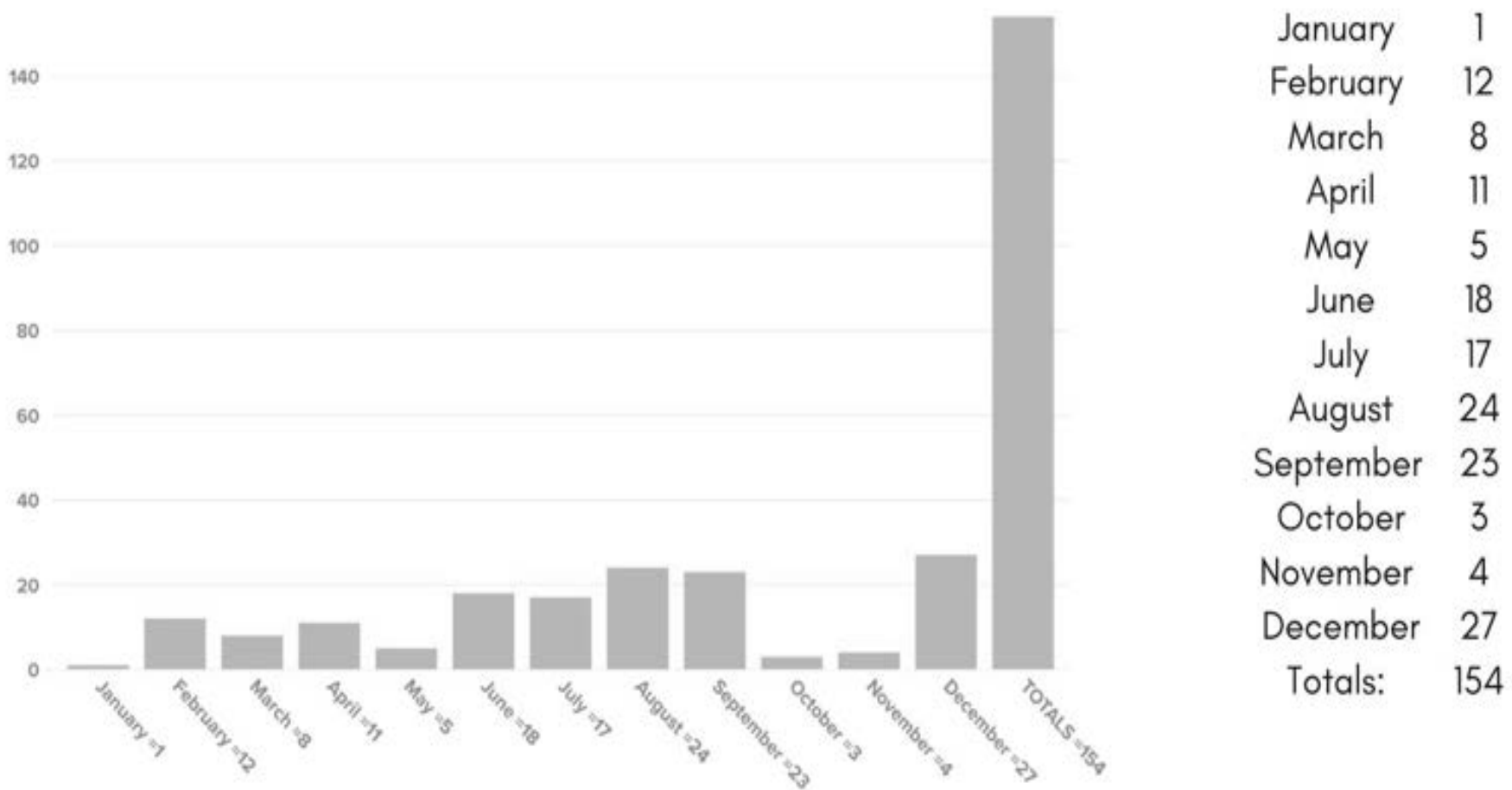

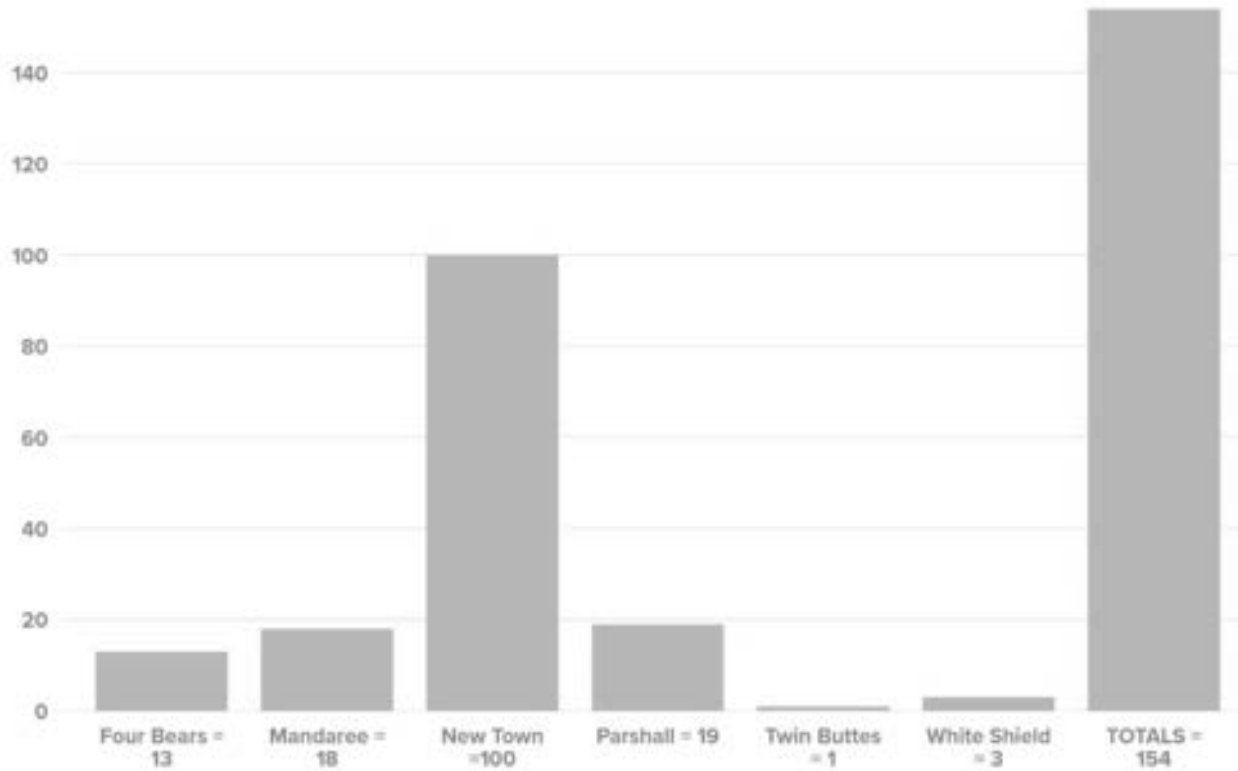


CY 2020 Fort Berthold Overdose By Month Jan.1,2020 To Dec.31,2020

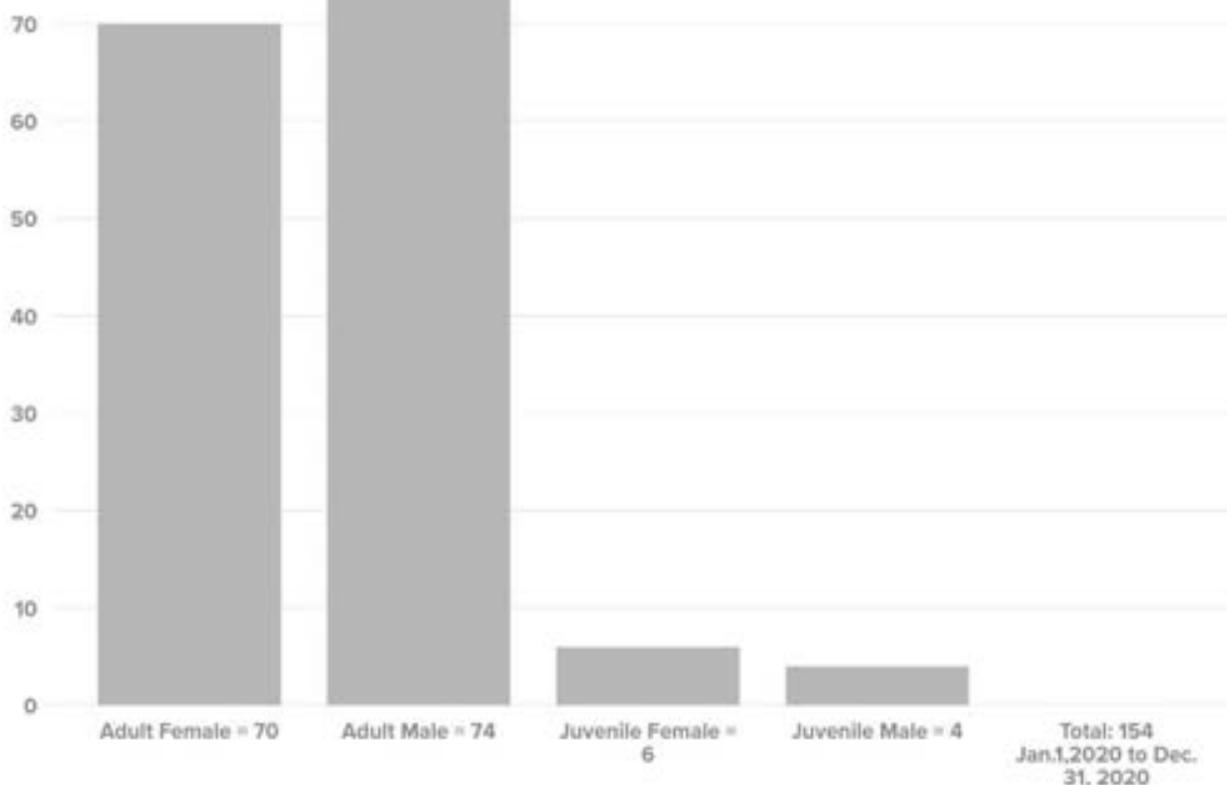

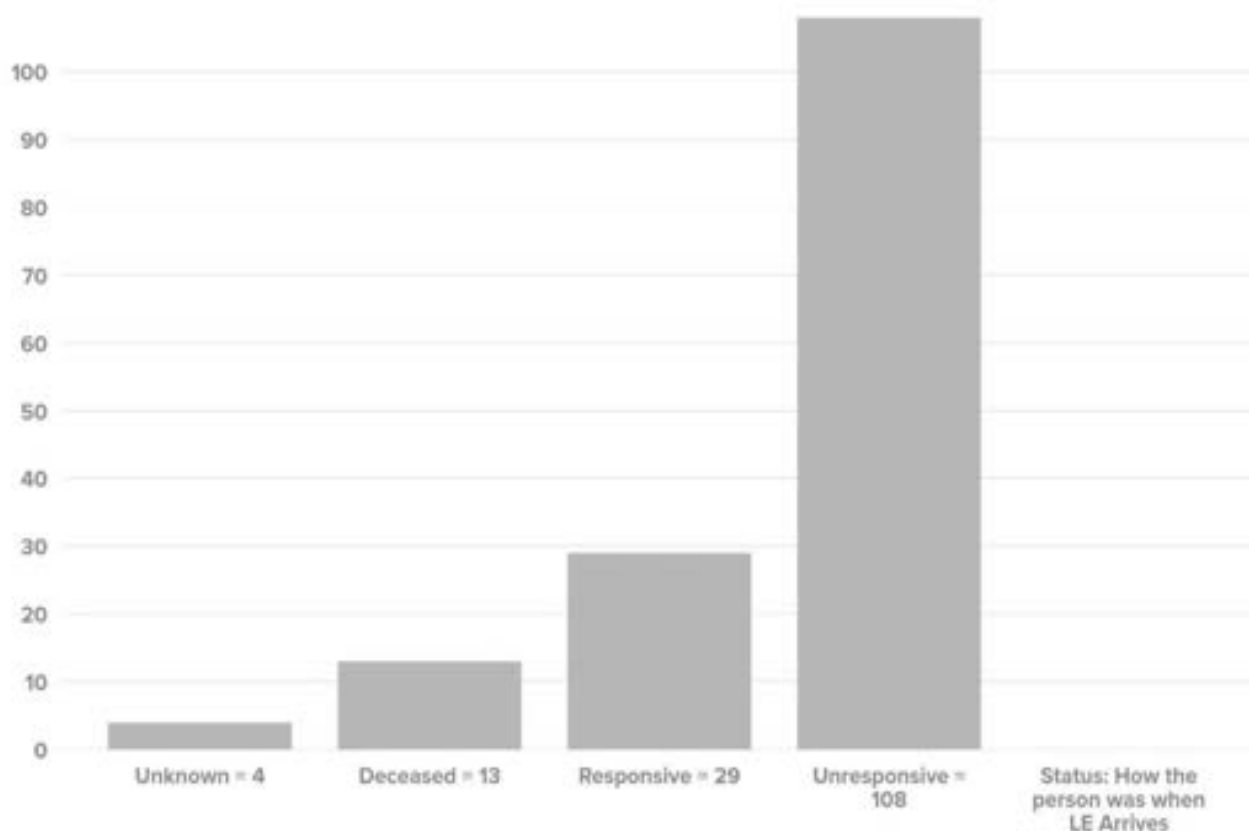
