Councilman Fred Fox's Greetings

*Hello Community Members,
Friends and Relatives:*

The summer has blown by with a blink of eye and fall season is upon all of us. The community has had one of the busiest summers that I can remember. We had a fun filled Community 4th of July event, the Arikara Celebration was a success and had some great weather along with the annual Ree Ranch Rodeo.

The Segment had a great turnout for the end of summer Employee Appreciation Day which everyone had enjoyed. We hadn't had one for the past few years since covid, so it was nice to enjoy the day with everyone.

We had (3) Grand Opening events for the White Shield Community. We had the Old Scouts Veteran's Memorial building, the Men's Sober Lodge and the Old #8 Diner.

The Veteran's building is one of the only Veterans Center on the Reservation. We have the MHA Veterans Building that serves the entire Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation. The Old Scouts Veteran's Memorial building will be the home to Young Hawk/Elmer Bear Post #253, Lady Auxiliary Post #253, Old Scouts Society, Dead Grass Society and all the Veterans that served our Country. Having a building for the Veterans, Auxiliary, and Society's for all their events is something that we only could imagine. The building had been requested by Post #253 and the Auxiliary. Not only did they request it, but they designed the entire building, my hat goes off to all of them for their hard work.

The "White Horse in Lead" Men's Sober Lodge in the community of White Shield was named after the Late Elmer Wells Jr. The sober lodge will help so many of our Tribal Enrolled men in the community and Reservation. Today we are the only segment to have both a Men and Women Sober Lodge.

The Old #8 Diner was the latest Grand Opening and having a restaurant has been wanted by several community members and Elders. This is needed to capitalize on so many activities in the White Shield Community. The restaurant will pay for itself with revenue made from sales throughout the year and it is fully staffed.

I wanted to go over the housing inventory for the White

Shield Community. There is always a housing shortage throughout the area, for our community members and professionals, such as nurses, doctors, law enforcement, and teachers. Since 2014 the East Segment Office has built and purchased (64) homes/duplexes. We currently have (6) Townhomes and (4) scattered stick-built homes being constructed, which would bring the total to 74 homes.

We have also built (3) apartment buildings which is a total of 41 units. This would be a total of 115 units (homes/apartments), which housed 115 families (single or multi-family). On the average, we are building 11.5 homes per year. There are several different housing programs. The one that always housed community members is the Fort Berthold Housing Authority. Throughout the years, the homes have become dilapidated and old. The program has lost funding over the years HUD and other resources. So, the Tribe has been the main rental housing program on Fort Berthold. However, the MHA Nation has had a successful Mortgage Program that funds itself over the past 10 years.

I also want to highlight a little bit on the road development in White Shield. In 2020, 12 miles of BIA 18 Loop was reclaimed and paved. In July, BIA 1 was selected to be reclaimed and paved. We will be looking to get the project started spring of 2025. We want to get a lot of the inner community taken care of with next year's budget.

Lastly, I wanted to touch a bit on the Tribal Investments with the People's Fund, Tribal JTAC, Education Fund, and Economic Fund. The Tribal Education, Economic and Tribal JTAC are invested in Goldman Sachs. They have been invested since 2017 and have made a profit \$71.3 million from the interest. The People's fund has a total of \$861,774,000. Over the years we have been building the People's Fund and other funds since 2012. The People's Fund has been in Bureau of Trust Fund Management and over the years has paid out \$132 million in interest back to the fund. We have understood that the interest rate fluctuates with Treasury bonds from 2%-4% interest. We wanted to get higher returns for the People with part of the Fund. So, the Tribe has elected to become an equity investor in TWG. By taking out the \$250 million and investing it in TWG, the Fund has the potential returns that would increase the fund to \$1.9 billion after 10 years. Electing to leave it in BTFA the fund would increase to \$1.2 billion. We believe over the length of time the People's Fund would grow at a faster rate. As always there's always risks in the market and in Treasury Bonds being called back. We will continue to always look out for the Funds and do what's in the best interest for the People. TWG is a diversified financial service holding company with estimated 2024 net earnings exceeding \$4.5 billion and estimated value of \$32 billion. The Company organizes its holding into five business groups including:

- Guggenheim Investments, an investment manager with over \$375 billion of assets under supervision.
- Guggenheim Securities, a leading investment banking firm.
- Group 1001 Insurance, a group of nine A-rated



insurance companies in the property & casualty, life & annuity, health, and specialty sectors with over \$57 billion of assets in 2022.

- Finance & Corporate Lending, a proprietary, diversified portfolio of private loans.
- Merchant Banking, a proprietary portfolio of direct (private) equity investments, including the Sports, Entertainment and Media group.

With that said, I would like to wish everyone a safe fall season and our students a successful school year.

Statement from MHA Nation Chairman Fox

On behalf of the Tribal Business Council (TBC) and as Chairman and designated spokesperson for the MHA Nation, I'm providing a statement and brief report of a recent investment and partnership made by our Nation. The Tribal Business Council is moving \$250 million from the BTFA in order to diversify the MHA Nation's assets and earn more revenue in a higher yielding investment. The \$250 million was used to purchase an equity interest in a diversified holding company and will remain an asset of the People's Fund. It is not being spent on a casino or used in any way other than as an investment that is expected to gain substantially more earnings to the MHA Nation than what it would otherwise earn if it remained with the BTFA.

BACKGROUND

For more than 10 years, the MHA Nation has invested available revenue earned from our successful energy program. Year by year, most of the funds targeted for investment have been placed in the People's Fund, with a smaller portion placed in private investment firms such as Vanguard, Payden & Rygel, and Goldman Sachs. The Peoples Fund account is managed by the Bureau of Trust Funds Administration (BTFA), a federal agency formerly known as OTFM, with a beginning balance of \$100 million. Going back to September of 2014, that fund balance was approximately \$290 million. Since its inception, the interest earned by the People's Fund has been used to fund a singular purpose: one annual distribution amount to membership (approximate cost of \$17.5 million). The principal amount, including annual deposits, is not used for any other tribal operating expenditure.

The revenues the MHA Nation first placed in commercial investments were deposited with two separate firms prior to 2014, with a total amount at or near \$100 million. Those private investment funds were later consolidated under one firm, Goldman Sachs, and have remained that way to present.

Since November of 2014, with the support of the Tribal Business Council, my administration steadily built these two investment accounts to more than \$1.1 billion; with over \$860 million in the Peoples Fund and over \$250 million invested with Goldman Sachs. By managing our annual budgets year after year, we have been able to provide additional revenue to increase our investment portfolio. But accomplishing this has also been very challenging in light of our tribal nation's tremendous reservation-wide infrastructure, new programs, and business development for the past nine years. These include new schools, community centers, healthcare facilities, housing, road construction, drug treatment programs/centers, and health insurance coverage for membership; just to name a few. Furthermore, we had to contend with a

world-wide pandemic and a very volatile oil market.

DILEMMA

Although our Nation has done a good job of placing and building our investment funds and portfolios, relying on BTFA management of our funds has serious issues. By policy, the federal government may only invest tribal funds in very limited investment options such as government treasury bills, etc. This has caused low returns and interest gains on our People's Fund. Historically and presently, BTFA has earned our nation's investment funds an annual income yield of about 3% (2.89% recently). Combining this low return with a national inflation rate of 2% or higher, means the value of our investment funds has had very poor and insignificant growth with BTFA! BTFA-managed returns also lack in comparison to the average gain of 7.5% on our private placement with Goldman Sachs. Plain and simple, when invested with the federal government, we struggle to "make our money work for us!"

STRATEGY

In the investment world, it is extremely important to have a balanced portfolio for effective wealth management. Although investment strategy as well as returns may vary for investment firms who are successful, an optimal balance of risk and return is usually the preferred means in achieving significant gains. With expert management, it is not uncommon for some to achieve annual returns of 20% or greater. But high returns usually include higher risks, so it would not be prudent or wise to invest 100% of an investment portfolio in a high risk/high return portfolio either, even if the prospect of gains can be very substantial.

The best strategy for investment lies with a balanced portfolio of investment options; combining low, medium, and high prospective risk and return. In layman's terms, spread the money strategically, to achieve greater return while not overstepping the boundaries of reasonable risk.

It must be clearly understood that without the TBC placing new deposits year after year in the People's Fund, the fund would have had significantly less growth, earning an average of 3% per year by BTFA. The time has now come to strategize for a greater return on our investment funds by taking proactive steps to increase the funds by choice of more prudent management options. Leaving more than 80% of the People's Fund with BTFA at a net gain of 1% over inflation is NOT IN THE BEST INTEREST of our MHA Nation and its membership. It is time to fix the lingering problem of dismal returns by reducing that 80% portion to something more reasonable and conducive to reasonable returns.

NEW INVESTMENT AND PARTNERSHIP

Our investment is in a diversified and well-managed company with a long track



record and holdings in financial services, insurance, corporate finance and private investment businesses. A portion of the investment has a guaranteed 8% return (which is in and of itself higher than the investments with the BTFA) and has the potential to realize returns of 15% to 20% or more. We believe this is a sound opportunity for our Nation to increase the value of our People's Fund as well as improve the financial capacity for continued economic development by our MHA Nation. Simply put, we think our investment and partnership represents an opportunity to enhance and significantly grow our portfolio so as to profoundly benefit the MHA Nation and its people. In fact, it is our belief that the People's Fund will grow faster and stronger because the investment is expected to provide much higher returns than the low returns provided by BTFA and its restrictive policies that are plaguing tribal nations who invest with them! We believe that this opportunity represents the strongest investment opportunity to properly meet our strategy of improving the balance of our investment funds.

Our own financial analysts have shown that moving \$250 million of the \$860 million in the People's Fund to this investment position can dramatically increase returns and if the investment goals are realized, provide an additional \$700 million to the People's Fund and our Nation over the next 10 years, in comparison to leaving the entire \$860 million at BTFA and its diminutive returns.

FINAL SUMMARY

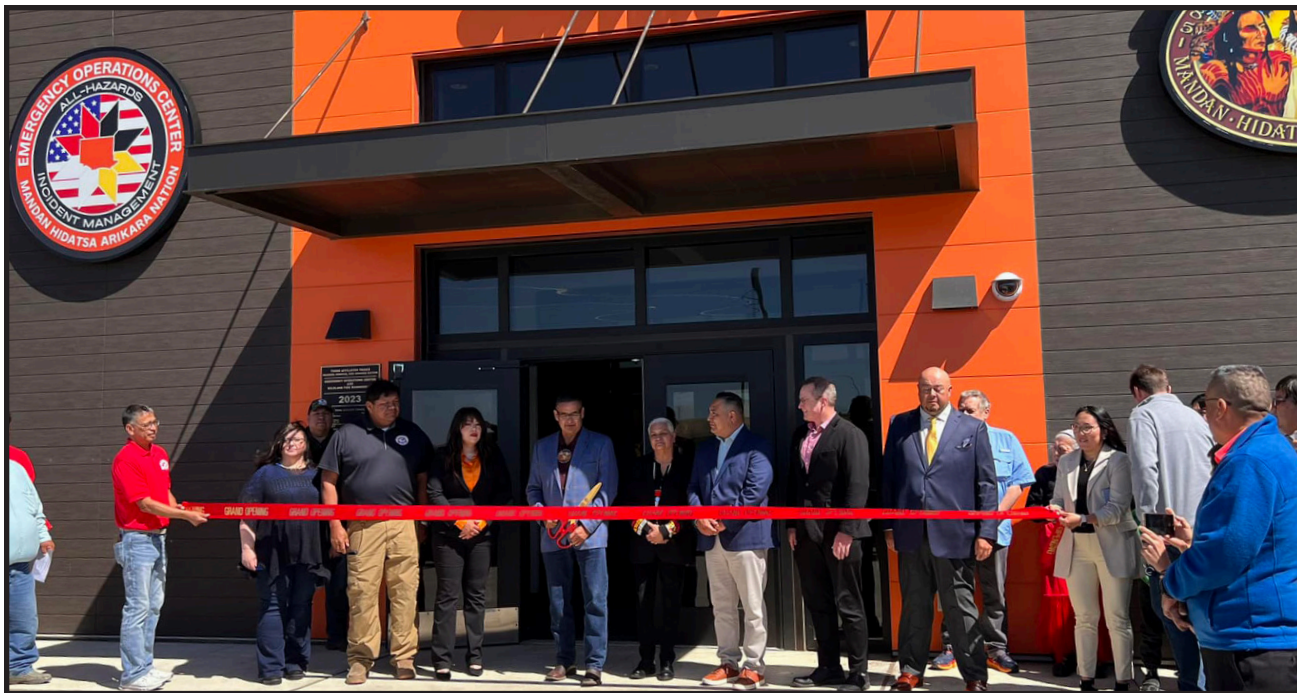
After serving nearly 10 years as Chairman of our Nation and with the support of the majority of our TBC and people, it has always been my administration's objective to continuously build the balance of the People's Fund to what it is today, evidenced by our frequent contributions to the fund,

year after year! Without that objective, the People's Fund balance would be less than half of what it is today, due to the severely low returns that the BTFA provides annually. In addition to the significant infrastructure and program development that our Nation has accomplished and enjoyed, just as important is the need to build for the future of our great Nation, and the generations to come!

Placement of our hard-earned tribal revenue in investment options outside of BTFA is not a new idea or proposal. It actually began prior to my administration, e.g. with private investment firms such as Vanguard and Payden & Rygel. In these partnerships and with our current investment strategy, we are now taking a bold position to increase investment returns to the People's Fund so that we can better provide better subsequent benefits to the people of our membership and MHA Nation!

I am providing this overview and statement to reassure our membership that the TBC is making sound and sometimes difficult decisions to continue to enhance our Nation's investment and financial capabilities. This is necessary to counter the typical and deliberate dissemination of misinformation by some groups and individuals who are perpetuating their own personal agendas for their own benefit, political or otherwise.

For those of the majority of our membership who are reasonably minded, I strongly encourage you to keep the faith in an administration that continues to accomplish dependable and significant development for our communities and reservation. We have come a long way, and it is best to encourage each other to figure out ways to unite for our best interest, and not be swayed by those who only commit to divisiveness, negativity, and empty rhetoric.



MHA Nation hosts grand opening of new Emergency Operations Center

NEW TOWN, ND (KXNET) — One tribe was celebrating the grand opening of their new emergency services building.

The celebration kicked off with a prayer, ribbon cuttings, colors, and distinguished guest speaker remarks in the command room.

They have a shelter room which is called the command center with walls built out of concrete. Inside that room, they have a safe room that fits the criteria set by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Together, the rooms fit more than 200 people, keeping everyone safe from tornadoes and natural disasters.

MHA Nation cuts ribbon at new emergency services building

The emergency operations center helps with man-made and natural disasters and recovery efforts following the FEMA natural response framework. Also, They have a fire management team that fights grass and forest fires.

Fire management officer Marle Baker shares what this new space means to him.

“Our old space is probably about the size of this room. Now we have all have individual offices with dedicated storage areas, equipment we can work on out of the cold. It is an exciting time for us,” said Marle Baker, the fire management officer.

It cost \$24.6 million to complete this project. Baker says they are hoping this becomes a regional training facility for all emergency responders and a response center.

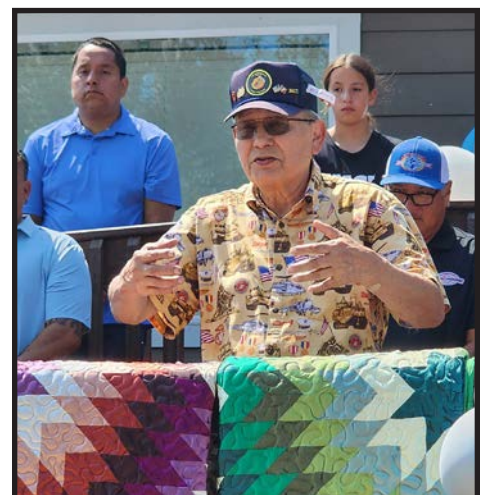
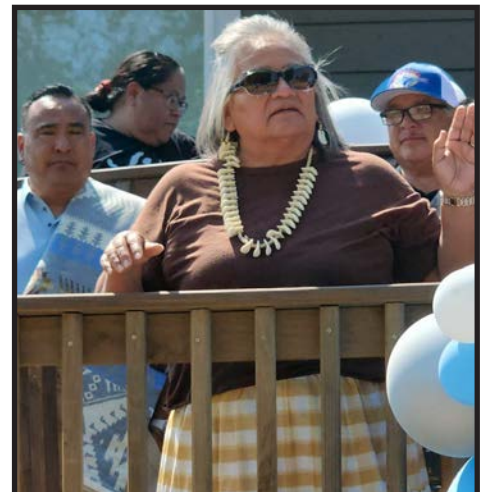

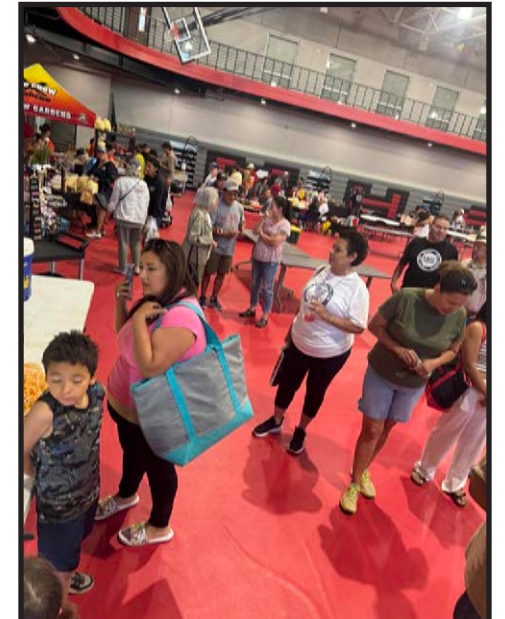

BISMARCK, ND (KXNET) — The U.S. Marine Corps Silent Drill Team and their Drum and Bugle Corps are set to return to MHA Nation for two special performances on Monday, August 26th, at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. This event promises to be a remarkable display of precision, discipline, and military expertise.

For those unfamiliar with the Silent Drill Team, the experience is nothing short of awe-inspiring. The precision and hard training that go into their performance are evident in every move.

“It’s something that nobody should miss,” explains MHA Chairman Mark Fox. “The precision, the discipline, the expertise, the hard training that goes into doing what they do. It’s amazing, everything. You have thousands and thousands of school children in there, and when they were asked, of course being silent, you could have heard a pin drop. I’ve never been in that many kids in one building, in one room, and not a word, not nothing. They were just really fixed on it.”

MHA Nation has a deep history of honoring military service, and this event is particularly meaningful to the community.

“Native Americans serve in the military at a higher ratio than any other ethnicity or race in the United States,” an organizer adds, “and especially so at MHA.”

“This is a way of showing respect to those who serve and our veterans,” said Fox.

The event also holds personal significance for those involved in bringing it to MHA Nation.

“Just the amount of time it takes,” recalls Specialist Kelly Baker. “The drill, the training is something that’s unquestionably, undeniably, the most, I would say, complicated process in

regards to what they do there, and how they perform for the community, for us. To be a part of that process, I’ll hold dear to my heart in regards to just the sacrifices, the time, and the training, and having the opportunity and the honor of serving there. To be a part of the Silent Drill Team was an honor, and to bring that back to my hometown is something truly remarkable.

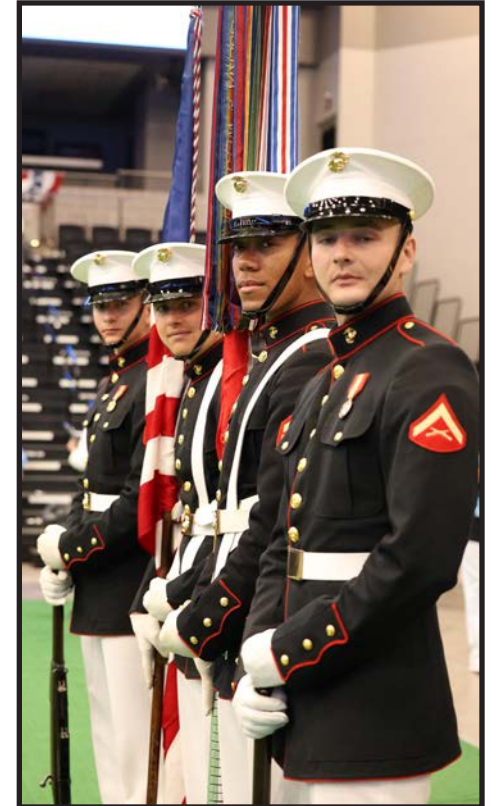

ROY PACKINEAU

Roy Neil Packineau was born November 16, 1964, in Garrison, to Tracy Packineau Sr. and Annette (Bird Bear) Packineau. He was raised in White Shield, in a tall, white house in the long coulee south of White Shield. His dad passed away while he was young and he was raised by his stepdad, Edwin Benson. Roy graduated from White Shield High School and entered the United States Army. He was medically discharged after an accident while he was home on leave.

Roy continued his education in Box Elder, Utah, where he received multiple training certificates as a heavy equipment operator. He worked for Kennecott Copper Mine in Utah for many years. During this time, he was once married to Judy Picard.

He later met Jacqueline Holona and they were married in New Mexico. They returned to North Dakota in 2002 where Roy worked at the ANG-Dakota Gasification Plant in Beulah. They lived in Twin Buttes and Bismarck before settling in Parshall. Roy helped Jackie raise her grandchildren, Tsosie and Naveah. Jackie passed away in April 2023. In November 2023, Roy married Ina Mae Rodriguez and they made their home in Mandan.

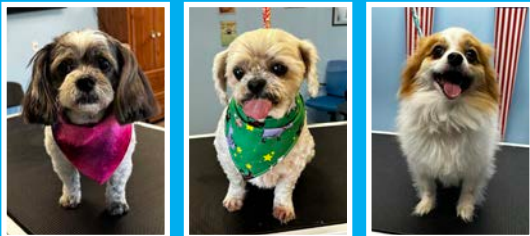
